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
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

Dell admits PCs come with huge security flaws

ell has been forced to admit it pre-installed on millions of PCs and laptops a tool that hackers could have exploited to steal users' bank details. It was one of two serious security flaws identified on Dell PCs in the space of days.

News

First, on Monday 23 November, Dell acknowledged that a security feature on some of its computers, known as a self-signed root certificate, contained a severe vulnerability. Self-signed root certificates are used to ensure that data sent online is encrypted, and therefore safe.

But on some Dell PCs and laptops (mostly the Inspiron, Precision and XPS ranges) sold since July this year, a certificate called eDellRoot also contained the 'key' used to decrypt it (see screenshot). This meant hackers could have exploited this flaw to trick people into visiting fake sites that look genuine.



icon in the browser's address field convinces people that it's safe to enter their username and password. If you fall victim to this while banking online, hackers can gain access to your bank account.

In a blog post admitting the flaw (www.snipca.com/18928), Dell said that eDellRoot was added to make it "faster and easier for our customers to service their system".

Dell insisted that the tool isn't "adware or malware" and that it allowed Dell's customer services to quickly identify the model of a person's computer.

The company has released instructions on removing

eDellRoot (see box below), and confirmed it won't be installed on PCs in the future. It also issued a software update that will remove the certificate from affected PCs.

Reminders of Lenovo's Superfish

The second problem, which emerged on 25 November, also involved an unsafe security certificate, although it wasn't pre-installed on computers. This one was unwittingly added to PCs by users who downloaded the Dell System Detect tool between 20 October and 24 November. Dell says that the tool gives

Some credit has to go to Dell for releasing a fix so quickly, particularly given how reluctant Lenovo was earlier this year to admit the dangers posed by Superfish. But both scandals illustrate that we can no longer take for granted the safety of new PCs. As well as considering price, hardware and operating system when buying a computer, we now have to wonder whether it's riddled with security holes big enough for hackers to exploit. Is it any wonder that sales of computers are plummeting?

users a "more personalised experience" when contacting the company's support website. It has now been replaced by a safer alternative.

Both cases are reminiscent of the Lenovo scandal earlier this year, in which the PC manufacturer was caught installing an unsafe version of the Superfish adware on to some laptops. The company later apologised, and released a tool to remove Superfish: www.snipca.com/18943.

Baby boomers stay safer online than under-30s

The idea that younger people know more about technology than older generations has been challenged by new research into online security.

Antivirus company Norton found that so-called millennials – people reaching young adulthood around the year 2000 – are more likely than baby boomers to leave themselves exposed to risk on the internet.

In its 2016 Cybersecurity Insights Report (www.snipca. com/18873), Norton said that 32 per cent of millennials in the UK share their passwords for online services, while only 13 per cent of baby boomers do.

The survey, which questioned 17,125 adults across 17 countries about their online behaviour, also found that just 33 per cent of millennials said they always use a secure password (one consisting of at least eight letters, numbers and symbols). By contrast, 49 per cent of baby boomers always use one.



Younger people are also much more likely to abandon an online account, rather than go through the hassle of closing it.

Many millenials simply aren't worried about the risk posed by poor online security. One in three felt that security breaches no longer have any real consequences – a complacency attributed to their increasing frequency –while one in five thought that their chances of becoming a victim of cybercrime was negligible. This reckless attitude has led to a much higher incidence of online crime targeting millennials, with 31 per cent reporting they have been a victim, compared with 13 per cent of older people.

In total, of the 1,000 people in the UK surveyed, 44 per cent said they had been a victim of cybercrime.

Twenty-two per cent of respondents said they had experienced cybercrime in the past 12 months, with 15 per cent of these being targeted by ransomware.

RUSSIAN HACKERS STEAL £520M SINCE 2012

Hackers in Russia stole at least \$790m (around £520m) in the past three vears from individuals and businesses in the US and western Europe. This was the work of 160 hackers, all now arrested. However, the criminal gangs have recruited over 1,000 new members, so the true amount of money stolen is likely to be much higher. The figures come from a Kaspersky report that highlights the severity of the threat posed by Russian cybercrime.

CHANGE YOUR AMAZON PASSWORD

Amazon has asked some customers to reset their password, leading to fears that its security systems may have been breached. In an email to what's thought to be a small number of users, Amazon said that some passwords had been "improperly stored", or exposed to other companies that Amazon deals with. Amazon said that it has "no reason" to suspect fraudulent activity.

Windows 10 to be the 'most widely installed version ever'

Windows 10 is set to be Microsoft's most successful operating system (OS) ever. The prediction comes from technology marketing company Gartner, which said that Windows 10's popularity is being driven by Microsoft's offer of a free upgrade to Windows 7 and 8 users.

Gartner also said that 50 per cent of businesses worldwide will be running Windows 10 by January 2017. If this happens, the early success of Windows 10 would trump even that



enjoyed by Windows 7, which launched in October 2009.

Businesses are preparing to move on from Windows 7, aware that Microsoft will end support for the OS in January 2020. Microsoft's latest estimates, released in October, indicate that Windows 10 is now running on 120 million computers worldwide.

Earlier this year, Gartner identified another consequence of Windows 10 – a slowdown in global PC sales. Analysts said that for the third quarter of 2015 PC

sales were 7.7 per cent lower than in the same quarter in 2014. This was attributed in part to people upgrading their existing PCs to Windows 10 for free, rather than buying a new computer containing the OS.

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Do you block adverts? Then Yahoo Mail will block *you*

Yahoo Mail has started to prevent some users from opening their emails until they disable advert-blocking tools in their browser.

People in the US using AdBlock Plus (https:// adblockplus.org) in Chrome and Firefox have reported seeing error messages when they attempt to open their inbox (see screenshot).

The message reads: "Uh oh... We are unable to display Yahoo Mail. Please disable Ad Blocker to continue using Yahoo Mail". Several workarounds to the block have been suggested online (see box below).

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Yahoo explained the message by saying it is testing "a new product experience" for a "small number" of Yahoo Mail users in the US.

The company is probably gauging how people react to having their emails blocked, hoping the majority will turn off their ad-blocking software.

HOW TO BEAT YAHOO'S BLOCK

If Yahoo extends the block to the UK, you can try getting round it by opening Yahoo Mail in a browser other than Firefox or Chrome, then clicking the top-right Settings cog. In the dropdown menu, click Settings, then 'Viewing email'. Change the view to Basic, then click Save and re-open Yahoo Mail. You could also try the solutions suggested by Adblock Plus users on their forum: www. snipca.com/18858. It's a highly controversial move that will further fuel the debate on ad-blocking tools.

Many web companies have attacked how ad-blockers work. They say that the money they get from advertising helps them to keep their online services free.

Without reliable advertising revenue many websites, particularly those run by magazines and newspapers, would probably start charging people to access them.

Some newspapers, including *The Guardian* and *The Washington Post* in the US, have displayed messages on their websites to ask visitors to disable their ad-blockers.

GMAIL WARNS YOU ABOUT DODGY EMAILS

Google will start warning Gmail users when they receive an email through an unencrypted connection. In a blog post (www.snipca. com/18834) Google said that it found "regions of the internet" such as malicious servers preventing the encryption of emails. Google is concerned about the dramatic rise of potentially unsafe emails sent to Gmail users from other email providers.

FACEBOOK 'BANS' WOMAN CALLED ISIS

A US woman claimed that Facebook suspended her account because she shares her first name with the terrorist group ISIS. San Francisco-based web engineer Isis Anchalee said that she proved her identity to Facebook three times, including by sending a screenshot of her passport. But it appears that she fell foul of Facebook's controversial 'real-name' policy, which insists people use "authentic" names. Facebook eventually re-enabled her account, and apologised (www.snipca. com/18843).

WATCH OUT FOR XMAS FRAUD ONLINE

Last-minute Christmas shoppers have been warned about falling for online scams, after figures show there was a rise in internet fraud between December 20 and 23 last year. In total, online fraudsters stole £16m from UK shoppers and businesses last Christmas, up from £9.5m in 2013. Shoppers should in particular be careful when buying mobile phones, which was the most common item involved in online fraud last December.

UK to launch cyber attacks on ISIS

The Government will launch cyber attacks against Islamic State (ISIS) as it attempts to thwart the terrorists' plans to hack UK hospitals and other vital infrastructure.

George Osborne said he will double cyber security funding over the next five years to reach £1.9 billion. He said that ISIS's "murderous brutality has a strong digital element".

"At a time when so many others are using the internet to enhance freedom and give expression to liberal values and creativity, they are using it for evil," he said.

While British intelligence



indicates that ISIS doesn't yet have the ability to cause harm to the UK infrastructure, Osborne warned they "are doing their best to build it".

He added: "The stakes could hardly be higher – if our electricity supply, or our air traffic control, or our hospitals were successfully attacked online, the impact could be measured not just in terms of economic damage, but of lives lost".

Security experts warned that an ISIS cyber attack could have devastating consequences for British businesses and infrastructure.

Bitdefender's chief security strategist, Alexandru Catalin Cosoi, said: "A possible worst-case scenario is the crippling of all communication and critical infrastructures, ranging from mobile phone to water supply, electricity and gas".

Why did Microsoft remove its November update?

The strange saga of the 'here today, gone tomorrow' Windows 10 update

ithin hours of subscribers receiving Issue 463, several frustrated readers had emailed us to ask why they couldn't find the option to download the Windows 10 'November' update at www.snipca. com/18730. This URL, which appeared in our 'Master Windows 10's updated tools' Workshop, takes you to the Windows 10 download page. It was the correct URL, and the correct website, but between Computeractive going to press and the issue dropping on the doormat, Microsoft removed the update download option.

Nobody seemed to know why it had done this. The company's only response was that "future installs should be through Windows Update". Some Windows experts speculated it was because many users had reported problems with the update. For example, it reinstalled apps

The company said that the flaw, which reverted settings to Microsoft's default, affected "an extremely small number of people". The reinstated update contains a fix that keeps all the privacy options as you set them. explain them anyway). 'Background apps' lets you decide which apps run in the background, while 'Sync with devices' lets you synchronise data between your PC and phone or tablet.

It's less obvious from its name what SmartScreen Filter does. In fact in Edge and Internet Explorer it warns you when you are about to visit a "suspicious" website or download something potentially harmful. In Windows 10, SmartScreen Filter checks the safety of URLs used by apps you install from the Windows Store. It was the latter that the update changed, reverting the setting to 'on'.

Is this something to worry about? Not really. Most people would have had SmartScreen Filter switched on anyway, even if they have no intention of installing apps from the Windows Store.

More disconcerting was that the update changed the 'advertising ID' setting, one of

the most controversial in Windows 10. It's switched on by default, allowing apps to show you adverts tailored to your interests. Millions of users have disabled it, though this doesn't block adverts – it just means they will be randomly displayed.

The truth is, Microsoft needs to sell a lot of advertising in order to recoup money it lost by giving away Windows 10 for free. It's likely the company's money men weren't too upset that the update re-activated this setting with minimum fuss.

To Microsoft's credit, it did explain how to restore your defaults (same URL as above). For SmartScreen Filter and 'advertising ID', click Settings, Privacy, General (see screenshot); for 'Sync with devices', click Settings, Privacy, 'Other devices'; and for 'Background apps' click Settings, Privacy, 'Background apps'.

Microsoft's transparency is welcome, but we feel slightly nervous about the more substantial updates planned next year. Don't be surprised if they cause bigger problems.

Microsoft admitted that the update changed your privacy settings

they had previously deleted (see our Cover Feature, page 50). But then on 24 November, just a few days after the update disappeared, it was back. This time we did get an explanation, and even an apology.

Microsoft said it took down the update after realising it was inadvertently altering some privacy settings on Windows 10 PCs, overriding changes users had previously made (Windows 7 or 8 PCs This of course begged the question – which privacy settings had been altered? Thankfully, Microsoft revealed which ones when announcing the update's return (www. snipca.com/ 18901). The four changed settings were 'advertising ID', SmartScreen Filter, 'Background apps' and 'Sync with devices'.

The purpose of the last two in this list are pretty self-explanatory (but we'll

in the NHS. However, this progress is all underpinned by Information Governance and doctor-patient confidentiality. While it might seem convenient to have an email correspondence from your GP, one cannot guarantee who is actually reading the patient's emails (or who might have access to them), and that it won't lead to a breach of confidentiality.

Recent improvements have seen certain NHS trusts implementing digital patient notes and remote access to a patient's observation for junior doctors while they are on call, with alerts and tasks being delivered to their smartphone. The next phase will be to standardise digital patient notes so that these can be accessed and shared across healthcare providers currently patients have multiple sets of paper or electronic notes and the information can be difficult to access. But, as always, until the NHS accepts one standard for managing digital information, this will be developed in different trusts and adopted at different rates.

How do I prove an inherent fault after three years?

I bought a Kindle Fire HD tablet from John Lewis in 2012, but I'm now having trouble with the USB port, making it difficult to charge the device. Because it's no longer under warranty John Lewis told me to contact Amazon. I've seen other complaints about this problem online so would this be classed as inherently faulty? lan White

Others' comments online about a problem are useful, but they don't have any legal weight and can't be used as evidence.

Because more than six months has passed since purchase, the burden of proof is on Ian to show that the fault is inherent, and not wear and tear or accidental damage. If he wants to pursue this he'll need to get the tablet examined independently. His contract is with the retailer, which in this case is John Lewis, not Amazon (the manufacturer of the Kindle range). He should tell John Lewis he's getting the tablet tested, and that it

> will need to replace it or reimburse him if this proves the tablet is inherently

I bought a laptop from PC World on 13 August this year. The keys were sticking so I tried to return it on 5 September. PC World said customers have only three weeks to return goods, so mine would have to be repaired. They also said that if I took out a £7 monthly service plan it would lend me another laptop until mine was fixed. The laptop is now on its third repair for the same problem and PC World is now saying that it's my fault for downloading viruses. Despite paying monthly for the service plan, I've never been loaned a laptop. PC World says it can loan one only if one is available. I've since bought another laptop. What are my rights?

Jacob Ninian

We believe Jacob is entitled to a full refund for the laptop and for whatever he's paid toward this service plan.

Because Jacob bought the laptop in August, his protection falls under the old Sale of Goods Act (SOGA). This is a shame because Jacob could have benefitted from one of the new laws in the Consumer Rights Act (CRA), which was introduced on 1 October, but applies only to goods bought on or after that date. This states that



retailers have to refund customers after one failed repair.

But Jacob still has rights under SOGA. It states that retailers must carry out repairs within 'a reasonable time' and that any delay must not 'seriously inconvenience' the customer. PC World may argue otherwise, but we think that three repairs in two and a half months, forcing Jacob to buy a new laptop, has seriously inconvenienced him. We've written to PC World to say so.

We're also concerned about the way it appears PC World sold Jacob the service plan. Jacob admits that he didn't read the small print, but we want to know how clear it was made to him that the company may not be able to loan him a laptop due to stock

shortages. If that's the case, what's the point of a service plan?



Do I have to pay return delivery charges?

I bought a harmonica for £120 from www.brendan-power.com. It arrived with the cover plate bent, which means that one note won't play. The company has refused to pay my return postage of £7.25 because I failed to email them an MP3 recording of the problem, as they requested. I was also told an "absolute beginner" could have repaired the harmonica. Surely this is beside the point?

Yes, it is completely irrelevant. A customer shouldn't be expected to repair a damaged item. More importantly, Brendan-power must pay Dave the £7.25 to return the harmonica because it has an inherent fault. In cases like this, you're entitled to a refund for all costs: the purchase price, the original delivery fee, and whatever it costs to return the item.

Also, within the first six months, you don't have to prove that a fault is inherent



- the onus is on the company to prove that it's not. This means Dave doesn't have to email an MP3 to the company. However, there's no harm in him recording an MP3 in case he needs evidence later.

We stand up for your legal rights

Will I get a refund if I reject a Christmas present?

I've seen a really good online deal from Currys for a laptop I'd like to buy for my son for Christmas. If it turns out he doesn't want it, and there's nothing wrong with it, does the new Consumer Rights Act (CRA) let me reject it for a full refund?

Tim Murdoch

It depends when and why Tim decides to reject the laptop. The CRA doesn't let you reject goods simply because you've changed your mind. Only the Consumer Contract Regulations (CCRs) allow this, and you have just 14 days to do so. That means Tim shouldn't buy the laptop before mid-December if he wants to give his son the option of returning it for a refund soon

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after Christmas Day.

Tim should also bear in mind that if his son doesn't want to keep the laptop, he must return it to Currys within 14 days of telling the company that he is rejecting it. His son should also be careful when opening his presents on Christmas Day,

because the CCRs let you examine goods only, not use them. He certainly shouldn't run the initial set-up on the laptop. In other cases we've investigated, PC World - part of the same company as Currys

- have deemed setting up a laptop as 'use'. The CRA, which was introduced on

1 October, does let vou reject goods, but only if they have an inherent fault, and only within 30 days of purchase. Before the CRA, you had to return faulty items within a 'reasonable' time, which was often considered to be 30 days. But because this was never cemented in law, retailers sometimes insisted that customers had only seven or 14 days to return items. This 30-day period is now legally established by the CRA.



CASE UPDATE

Reader takes PC-repair shop to court over 'fake iPad screen'

When customers aren't satisfied with how a retailer savs it will resolve a complaint, they can

take the company to the small claims court. That's what Computeractive reader Sandy Mann plans to do, after refusing to accept a new iPad screen from her local shop Computers Repairs Conwy (CRC).

After cracking her iPad screen Sandy

paid CRC £80 for a replacement (as we reported in Issue 461). She claimed that the new screen was not an official Apple product, and therefore a fake. CRC's owner told us that the screen's supplier told him that it was genuine.

He promised Sandy he would fit another screen, and offered a full refund if she wasn't happy with it. But Sandy declined this because CRC couldn't guarantee it would be authentic. Her next move is to take CRC to the small claims court, where a judge may say that the company breached the contract it had with Sandy, and order it to pay the cost of the iPad being repaired by Apple.

However, the judge may decide that CRC's offer was reasonable, leaving Sandy with £80 and an iPad that still has a cracked screen. The judge may also conclude that Sandy bears some responsibility for using CRC rather than sending the iPad for repair using her insurance. We'll let you know what happens.

Scams and threats to avoid, plus new security tools

WATCH OUT FOR...

Ransomware that 'exposes' your data

What happened?

Cybercriminals have started using a sinister new tactic to force ransomware victims to pay up. As well as locking your PC, hackers are now threatening to publish your personal details online.

This approach has been spotted by German antivirus company Botfrei (www.botfrei.de/en). It said that hackers are using the Chimera ransomware to target computers in German businesses (see screenshot). If this new strategy proves successful, the hackers will almost definitely start attacking members of the public worldwide.

Chimera sneaks on to PCs in phishing emails that urge you to click a link to download a Dropbox file, supposedly containing information on a job application or business offer. Once



Chimera is on your PC, it encrypts all your connected drives and demands a ransom of 630 Euros in Bitcoins.


What's still unknown is whether the hackers are actually able to carry out their threat of publishing personal information. The ransom message tries to scare victims by claiming that photos and other data will be published online, but Botfrei says that there's no evidence that this has actually happened. Security experts examining Chimera say it works no differently to previous ransomware attacks, which all lacked the ability to publish victims' details.

What should you do?

Whether Chimera is capable of publishing your details or not, what really matters is that you regularly back up your most important data. This is the best defence against ransomware, and you're going to need it more than ever because we think Chimera is likely to target UK users next year. As scams go, we fear that scaring people with the threat of public exposure may well prove successful, and hackers will turn their sights on millions of Englishspeaking PC users next.

New tools

If you want proof of how greedily Google devours your data, look no further than its new 'About me' tool. Visit the site and anyone with a Google account (including Gmail and



Google's 'About me' https://aboutme.google.com

YouTube) will see their name and date of birth. Google wants you to add more details, such as your phone number, by clicking the red 'plus' button at the bottom right. Alternatively, you can just

tell Google to go mind its own business.

Google says the site makes it easier for you to control what personal data other people see online. And it does. But that's not the reason to use it. Instead, click the blue 'Go to privacy checkup' link to change how Google tracks you on the web. The most important sections are 4 - which lets you alter how much of your online activity Google saves (see screenshot) - and 5, where you can opt out of adverts targeted according to your interests.

PayPal scam looks genuine

I was almost caught out by a PayPal scam which I think is new. I received an email that looked professional and error-free. I had no reason to believe it wasn't from PayPal. It told me that there had been unusual activity on my account, and suggested I update my profile. With all the high-profile hacks recently, including TalkTalk, I instantly thought 'oh no', and clicked the link, which sent me to a 'profile update' page. It was only when they asked for credit-card details that it dawned on me that it was probably a scam. I found evidence of it online: www.snipca.com/18586.

Opera 33

Opera may not be as well-known as other browsers like Firefox and Chrome, but it offers similar features, such as **extensions**, cross-device syncing, and apps for your tablet and phone (there are various versions of the Opera app for Android, iOS and Windows). But it's also got a few unique tricks up its sleeve – more than ever in this new version.

Opera 33 not only sports a swanky new logo (see above right) and a rejigged user interface, but it also offers some big performance improvements. Its underlying engine uses less memory, making it run better on older computers.


But by far the most interesting and useful feature Opera has introduced is its Turbo browsing mode. When enabled, Turbo




cleverly compresses web pages, crunching images and other data so they load much faster and use less bandwidth.

Though Turbo mode effectively sends you smaller versions of the images and other media featured on a web page, Opera claims that you won't notice the effects of this compression – on most screens, at least. In other words, photos will look virtually the same as they do when they're uncompressed.

There are no **PUPs** to worry about in Opera's installer. However, if you want to stop Opera storing and sharing your data (see our 'Who's selling your data?' feature in Issue 463), click the Options button and untick 'Share usage data to help improve Opera'.



- To enable Turbo browsing, click the Opera button and then click the Opera Turbo option towards the bottom of the menu.
- If this is the first time you've enabled Turbo, you'll see a page of information. To visit a website, type its URL into the address bar or click its bookmark.
- Once the page has loaded, you'll see a blue speed-dial icon next to the web address. Click this to make sure that Turbo is used to speed up the page load.
- To switch Turbo off, click the Opera button and then click Opera Turbo. To enable syncing, click the user icon and click 'Create my account!'.

How can I convert an old PC into a jukebox?

I've got an old PC that I'd like to turn into a music jukebox. I used a computer-style jukebox in a pub recently and was really impressed by it. The screen display was laid out in a simple format, with icons for 60s, 70s, 80s and so on, along with the option to choose an artist by name or song title. Can you recommend a free program with similar features?

Most current music-player software lets you search by artist, album or song title. But to organise and browse your library by decade, you'll need a tool that can create automatic playlists based on specific criteria, such as a date range or songs you've 'starred'.



iTunes (www.snipca.com/18759) can do this, but we wouldn't recommend using it on an older PC because it's a memory-hog. Foobar2000 (www.snipca.com/18661, see Best Free Software Issue 463) is far more lightweight, though its auto-playlist process is convoluted. Give it a go if you're a confident software user; otherwise choose something simpler such as Windows Media Player. It's still available in Windows 10, even though Windows Media Center (WMC) has gone. In the Start search box type windows media player, and a setup window will open. To create Auto Playlists, click Library, 'Create playlist', then 'Create auto playlist'.

Another free program to try is Music Bee (www.snipca.com/ 18758, see screenshot; click the 'Direct' link). To create a 60s playlist, for example, right-click Playlists and select New, then New Auto-Playlist. Underneath 'match all', select Year and then select 'in range' from the dropdown menus, then type 1960 in the first box and 1969 in the second. Click Save.



PC Specialist Cosmos IV 15.6in

A fast Windows 10 laptop for less than you'd expect

When you think of a laptop nowadays, you probably think of something like a MacBook Air. Incredibly slim, conveniently light, and neatly carved out of a single piece of aluminium. Everything is perfectly designed and engineered into place. And that's where it's staying, because you can only buy a MacBook Air with a minimal set of features, and not even a trained engineer could shoehorn in anything else.

This is a machine made in the oldfashioned style. You get to choose what goes inside and outside

This isn't that kind of laptop. The Cosmos IV is a chunky black plastic slab, its industrial lines clumsily interrupted by ports, grilles and sockets. From the side, the lid looks like someone found a Mk2 Ford Escort bonnet in a skip and bent it to fit their Volvo. The DVD drive fascia is nearly the right shape, but the wrong colour. Nobody uses the analogue VGA monitor port any more, and it's too big for modern laptops – but they've wedged one in anyway, as well as the HDMI socket that supersedes it.

Now that Wi-Fi is standard, most laptops leave you to use a USB adapter if you want a wired network connection – but the Cosmos IV has an Ethernet socket too. And in case two USB 3.0 ports aren't enough, there's also an eSATA interface for fast external storage.

You might think all this makes the Cosmos IV a bit of a mess, or you might just be grateful that all these features still exist. This is a machine made in the old-fashioned style, and that means you get to choose what goes inside as well as

what's on the outside. PC Specialist builds each unit to order, and installs your preferred version of Windows, including Windows 10.

We picked what we reckoned was the best-value configuration, and it makes up in performance what it lacks in portability. A quad-core Intel i5 processor from the latest Skylake series (see 'What's All the Fuss About?', Issue 459) is more than adequate for web browsing, video and multitasking between several office apps. A sensible 8GB of memory ensures there's little hesitation even when returning to a program that's been idle for some time.

This is helped by Windows being installed on a built-in 128GB SSD, which is much quicker than a mechanical hard drive. About 70GB is left free for more programs and files, and for the rest of your stuff there's a 1TB hard drive installed too. That bulky case begins to make sense. And there's more, because they've also crammed in a proper graphics card, the Nvidia GeForce 940M, with 2GB of its own memory. That means you can run 3D games in Full HD, at least with their quality settings turned down a bit, and even the fanciest new titles will work if you compromise on resolution.

You'll want headphones or speakers for

But the usefully big 15.6in 1920x1080pixel screen is bright and vibrant, with dark blacks for high contrast. The keyboard isn't backlit, which will be annoying when you need to work or play in dim light, but feels pleasant and accurate to type on, and we found the touchpad, a frustratingly weak point of some affordable laptops, very responsive.

Intel's Skylake chips are designed for power efficiency, but the Cosmos IV's battery still lasted us only four-and-a-half hours, and that would plummet with heavy use of 3D graphics. It's really too heavy to carry around regularly anyway, but quite practical to move around the house or take on trips in the car. And, if you squint, it doesn't look that awful. For the money, you'd be pushed to find a more capable laptop.

VERDICT: It's neither the prettiest nor the most portable laptop, but the performance is hard to beat in this price bracket

ALTERNATIVE: Dell Inspiron 15 5558 £549 This looks nicer, but performance doesn't quite match the Cosmos and there's no SSD

Palicomp AMD Shockwave

A Windows 10 desktop PC that puts plenty of power at your fingertips

What is it with PC makers and military hardware? In Issue 462, we tested Chillblast's Fusion Drone, which to our disappointment bore no resemblance to a nuclear-powered unmanned aerial vehicle. Palicomp's Shockwave comes in a rugged black case that actually does look as if Prince Andrew should be demonstrating it to an audience of Saudi officials. LED lighting behind the grilles even emits an eerie green glow. But it's really quite harmless.

Like the Drone, the Shockwave is based on AMD's Athlon X4 860K processor. Palicomp has overclocked this from 3.7 to 4GHz, making it run even hotter. But where Chillblast installed a water-cooling system to prevent meltdown, this machine just has AMD's regular heatsink and a plastic fan.

We monitored the processor during our speed tests, and it wasn't affected by overheating. Within the Sharkoon VG5-W case the fans were never noticeably loud, although the Shockwave wasn't as silent as the Drone. But it did edge ahead in the benchmark tests. For a £500 desktop PC, this is pretty powerful. Just don't expect miracles: when editing video, for example, you'll still have to wait for effects to render.

Unlike its rival Intel, AMD also makes dedicated graphics cards, and the Radeon R7 370, which costs around £100 by itself, is becoming a popular choice for its impressive games performance. The Drone had it fitted with 2GB of its own memory, while the Shockwave doubles that to 4GB. This allowed us to run current 3D games smoothly at Full HD resolution, with some quality settings turned down for the most demanding – not bad at all in this price bracket.

A 1TB hard drive with 8GB of flash

storage provides decent capacity with a bit of extra speed, and you also get a DVD writer built in. There's room to add up to six more internal drives on the fast SATA 3 connection as well as two PCI-Express and one basic PCI slot for expansion. You might want to order a Wi-Fi card because it's not included in the price. The standard 8GB of memory can go up to 32GB. One missing feature is a fibre-optic audio output for modern amplifiers: you only get traditional 3.5mm jacks.

How to choose between the Fusion and the Shockwave? Palicomp's three-year warranty covers only labour after the first year, while Chillblast's covers both parts and labour for two years and then labour for three more. Chillblast will pick up your machine for service free of charge in those first two years; Palicomp only includes this for the first week.

Remember the warranty is in addition to your statutory rights, which say that if your PC goes wrong any time in the first six months, it's presumed to have an inherent fault that the supplier must fix at its own expense. You're also entitled to a free repair if a problem appears within six years and you can prove that it's due to a defect, not just normal wear and tear. We'd like to see all retailers being clearer about this, but extra cover like Chillblast's is very welcome.

On the other hand, Palicomp's PC clearly gives you a little more performance for your money. Overall, it represents a great deal.

Lenovo Yoga Tab 3 Pro

Your home-entertainment centre in a tablet

Lenovo makes two different product lines called Yoga. One is a series of Windows laptops that fold up to work like tablets. This item belongs to the other group, which are proper tablets, running Google's Android software. When we reviewed the Yoga Tablet 2 Pro (see Issue 454), we marvelled at its built-in video projector. This new version takes that feature a step further.

6 An innovative tablet let down by unreliable software

Despite the bigger model number, the Tab 3 Pro is smaller than the 2, and just a bit bigger than an iPad Air. The new screen is better: although it only covers 84 per cent of the sRGB colour range while the iPad exceeds 100 per cent - you wouldn't guess it when you see how bright and vivid it looks. With a similar resolution to Apple's Retina display, it's also really sharp.

The projector is built into a cylindrical section along the edge of the tablet, which acts as a hinge for a built-in stand. But the image now comes from the

middle rather than the end as in the earlier version, so the hinge can be used to adjust the projection angle. Combined with automatic correction for the 'keystoning' effect - ensuring the image is vertically square on your wall - this makes it quick to set up.

It's still not ideal: the image isn't as bright or sharp as from a full-size projector. But if you close the curtains, you can watch a film quite comfortably at a size of up to 70 inches. Just make sure mains power is at hand, because the battery could run out in two hours.

In normal use - without the projector - the Yoga Tab Pro 3 lasted us 12 hours (Lenovo quotes up to 18). Its Intel processor is very capable, but not all Android apps work with it, and as in previous reviews we found Lenovo's version of Android didn't feel sufficiently smooth. It's software glitches like this that so often prevent Android tablets feeling as practical and enjoyable to use as iPads.

The hardware is attractive, though. Although there's a lot of plastic, the faux-leather back feels good. Both of the cameras are decent, and the four built-in JBL speakers are much better than you'd expect, even if there's not much bass and we couldn't detect any benefit from the 'virtual Dolby Atmos' surround sound. The 16GB of storage may not be enough, but unlike with the iPad, you can add a microSD card to expand it.

VERDICT: A genuinely innovative Android tablet that would be fun to own, if only the software was more reliable



What's the best OCR scanner?

Over the years, I've accumulated a lot of work printouts for which I no longer have the digital files. Is there a scanner supplied with OCR software that could help me to digitise it all? Martin Carson



scanners, and most come with some kind of optical character recognition (OCR) software, which converts printed words into editable

text. But models designed for high-volume business scanning are expensive. The most affordable scanners today are those built into multi-function inkjet printers, which have a flat scanning glass under a lid, much like a photocopier.

If you have more than a few pages to scan, you'll save a lot of time by choosing a model with an automatic document feeder (ADF). Brother's MFC-J5320DW (pictured) is relatively compact and



currently discounted to a reasonable £80 (www.snipca. com/18805). It comes with a 35-sheet ADF and a basic version of Nuance's PaperPort

software, which performs OCR and helps manage your pile of documents.

Printer makers count on getting most of their profit from selling you ink, so if you don't use the inkjet part, you've lost nothing - in fact, quite the reverse.

Google Nexus 6P

Google shows how Android phones should be done

Google, whose Android software is used by the majority of phones and tablets not made by Apple, only makes two phones itself. Actually, it doesn't even make them, just sticks its Nexus logo on them. The Nexus 5X, which we tested in Issue 463, is manufactured by LG in South Korea. Its big brother, the 6P, comes courtesy of Huawei in China. We still can't adequately explain how to pronounce 'Huawei', but if you have children who leave toys lying around on the stairs, you'll say it eventually.

Not only is it bigger, with a huge 5.7in screen, but the 6P feels completely different from the cheaper 5X. Just 7.3mm thick and clad in aluminium, it's reminiscent of an iPhone at the front and sides, but the back is something else: smoothly curved, and with a protruding black camera bar that forms a sort of snorkel. It's a bold move to include a 'love it or hate it' feature like this on a flagship phone. Below that is a fingerprint scanner that unlocks the device.

6 Bold design, great camera and decent performance **5**

The camera itself takes an Apple-like approach, with a modest 12.3-megapixel resolution but plenty of features, including 240-frames-per-second slow motion, and excellent automatic exposure. Video is limited to Full HD rather than 4K. Our pictures were well balanced and detailed, even indoors, and there's a two-tone LED flash. The 8-megapixel front camera is also good. Colour balance has also been improved on the high-resolution screen, which looks more natural than the old Nexus 6

and covers the whole sRGB spectrum.

The Nexus 6P's eight-core Snapdragon processor runs the latest version of Android (6.0, also known as Marshmallow), very smoothly, and 3D games are no problem. Unlike some devices, it doesn't get hot in normal use. However, despite its large battery, we barely managed 12 hours of video playback, which is mediocre for a big phone. At least the USB Type-C port means charging is simple and quick - taking about 90 minutes to charge fully. You'll need an adapter cable to attach standard USB chargers or other accessories, and data transfer is only at USB 2.0 speeds.

More disappointingly, there's no microSD slot for memory cards, so the basic 32GB of storage - of which Android takes up 7GB - might not be enough if you like to keep a lot of photos, videos and apps. But the 64GB version is still good value at £50 extra.

VERDICT: The slightly retro design won't be for everyone, but this is a topclass Android phone at a very competitive price

High performance at a low price

Five hundred quid for a phone? You must be joking, you might think. I don't need all that, you might think. Retina this, fingerprint scanner that – who cares, as long as you can make calls, send texts and install a few apps? So you buy a budget smartphone. You turn it on. And then you remember it isn't really a phone at all, it's a computer. Features aside, that extra you pay is for performance: the ability to do the same things, but with less staring at the screen waiting (often praying) for them to actually happen.

Most smartphones run Google's Android software, and the cheaper they

are, the more they struggle to do it. Even the simplest task, like scrolling down a web page, can be alarmingly slow and jerky. Here's a phone, though, that breaks the mould. Its MediaTek processor is as powerful as those in phones costing twice as much. The nearest we've seen in this price bracket is the Vodafone Smart Ultra 6, and the Liquid Jade Z beats it. 3D games aren't its strong point, but everything else works gratifyingly smoothly.

In other respects, you get what you pay for. The 5in screen is sharp, but colours are quite dull and it doesn't get very bright. The case is nice and slim, but feels more like a plastic office chair than a high-tech accessory. Photos from the 13-megapixel camera show lots of detail, but their high-contrast look makes shadows too dark. Indoors, things get very grainy.

You'll soon be spending another tenner on a microSD card, given the miserly 8GB of storage, most of it eaten up by Android. Version 4.4 is installed, and although this will be upgradable to 5.0 (Lollipop), don't expect to see 6.0 (Marshmallow) on this phone. Finally, battery life won't get through a full day: in our video playback test it conked out after eight hours 20 minutes.

Flexible video editing on a budget

Movie Edit Pro takes video from an attached camera – or files stored on your PC – at up to 4K resolution. You arrange clips in order, then trim them and add effects and transitions. The end result can be burned to a DVD (if your PC has a DVD writer drive), saved to a file, or uploaded straight to YouTube, Facebook and Vimeo.

Your edit can be displayed as a timeline – such as in a professional video program – or more simply as a storyboard. Imported clips are listed at the top right, and tabs at the top let you access fades and transitions, titles and special effects. A version for smartphones and tablets,

A new video stabilisation **plug-in** does a good job of fixing obvious camera shakes, within reason, as well as some of the glitches that can creep in during fast movements. If your PC has a proper graphics card – and you'll need one for 4K editing – it'll be used to keep videos running smoothly without waiting for them to render.

Music Maker includes some of the kinds of features you'd find across all of these, at a relatively basic level.

You can arrange songs just by dragging some of Music Maker's thousands of loops – short snippets of music in styles such as rock, pop and dance – on to the multi-track timeline, or connect a USB keyboard and play the included software instruments to create songs from scratch. The program can also record live

There's a powerful 'cinematic synth', a fancy graphic equaliser, an extra drum machine, 2,000 new loops, and an on-screen keyboard that plays only correct notes. Now that really is magic.

Music Maker 2016 Live (£70) adds on-screen pads for hip-hop and electronic dance music performance as well as extra sounds and an unlimited number of tracks. The Live Performer



edition (£140) includes a two-octave hardware keyboard with drum pads, while Control (£120) comes with a plain four-octave keyboard.

Veho Muvi K2NPNG

An action camera with lots of extras

Trademark lawyers hate it when you use brands to reference a whole category of products. But we still do it. Most of us have a Hoover, possibly made by Zanussi. Or maybe a 'Dyson'... with 'Vax' written on the front. Some names just stick in the mind, and almost anything is better than 'vacuum cleaner'.

So it is with 'action cameras'. You'll see these strapped to bikes, helmets, canoes, snowboards and anything else that moves. Their owners call them GoPros, but GoPro isn't the only company that makes them. This one is from Veho, whose name you might recognise from the Southampton football strip.

It gives you a comprehensive outdoor-shooting kit

The Muvi K2 shoots Full HD video and. unusually, 16-megapixel photos. Like other action cameras, it can be controlled from your iOS or Android phone or tablet, but it comes with a little LCD screen that clips on to the back, so you can check what you're filming. You can find the K2 for as little as £130, which is great value. We tested the K2NPNG bundle, which includes an impressively chunky rugged case that's fully waterproof.

The case is big and fiddly, with mysterious buttons and replaceable mist filters, but it does a good job. A whole array of mounts is provided to attach to almost anything, and you can use GoPro mounts, too. The whole lot comes in an even bigger box with a carry handle.

Once you learn the controls, the K2 is straightforward to use, and it's easy to

switch between still and moving pictures. The results are more than good enough for casual and semi-pro use. Video goes up to 60 frames per second (fps), allowing 2x slow motion, or 120 fps at a lower 720p resolution. You can set a gravity sensor to start shooting when the camera moves, so you don't miss anything. The 8GB microSD card will only store 90 minutes of footage, but extra 32GB cards in this format cost under a tenner. The rechargeable battery. rated at four hours, lasted us two and a half, which is actually very good; it's not sealed in, so you can carry a spare.

Inevitably, competition comes from GoPro. The Hero+ LCD - with its built-in rugged case - is more compact, though not quite as waterproof. At the time of writing, Currys is selling it with a carry case and a 32GB microSD card thrown in for £199 (www.snipca.com/18798). Both cameras are great buys.

VERDICT: If you don't need the smallest camera, the Muvi gives you a good-value comprehensive outdoorshooting kit

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

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

So if your PC keeps crashing, you struggle connecting to the internet, your printer doesn't work or you're running out of storage space, FixWin 10 will help you fix any of these problems (and around 70 others) with the click of a button.



The download process for FixWin 10 differs slightly depending on which browser you use. We're using Windows 10's new browser Edge, but it's just as easy in Chrome, Firefox and Internet Explorer. Go to www. snipca.com/18705, scroll down and click the blue Download File button **1**. You'll see a message at the bottom of your browser window **2** when the download is completed. Click Open **3** to see four files, double-click the FixWin 10 setup file, then click 'Extract all'.






Next, click Browse **1**, select a location for the folder's contents on your PC (your Downloads folder **2**, for example), ensure 'Show extracted files when complete' is ticked, then click the Extract button **3**. When the folder opens, launch the FixWin 10 setup file **4**, then click Yes to open the program. FixWin doesn't create a Desktop shortcut, so you'll need to launch this setup file every time you want to use it. The program opens on a Welcome screen providing basic information about your PC (version of Windows 10, processor, hard drive and so on).




Before using FixWin, it's a good idea to create a system restore point so you can undo any changes you make if you're unhappy with them. Click that option **1**. After a few seconds, you'll see a 'Restore point has been created successfully' message. Click OK, then click System File Checker Utility **2**. This will scan your PC and fix any corrupted files. You'll see a message informing you the scan is taking place in the background. Click OK to see a Command Prompt window showing the progress of the scan. It takes about 10 minutes and you'll need to restart your PC if any problems are detected. FixWin 10 contains six sections **1**, each containing a number of fixes **2**. Every fix has two buttons **B**. The question mark (?) button describes the problem in more detail and explains what FixWin will do if you click the Fix button. In most cases, clicking Fix will simply change a value in your PC's Registry or add a command to your PC's Command Prompt. First, click the Windows 10 section to see a list of common problems reported by users after upgrading their operating system.



Windows 10 hogs a lot of your hard drive, but syncing OneDrive can slow your PC further. If you don't use Microsoft's cloud-storage service, click the 'Disable OneDrive...' Fix button **1**, then click OK **2** to confirm your changes upon reboot. Some options (like OneDrive) also have a Revert button **5**, letting you undo the action. If your Wi-Fi doesn't work in Windows 10, then simply click the 'Wi-fi doesn't work after upgrading to Windows 10' fix **4**. Work through the list in this section to fix any other problems you have with Windows 10.

Next, click File Explorer 1 to see fixes for problems associated with File Explorer, Recycle Bin and your folders. Some options include a choice of two fixes, so click the question mark button 2 to see what each fix does 2. In this section you can recover a missing Recycle Bin icon, fix a problematic DVD drive and restore folder thumbnails in File Explorer. Don't worry if your problems aren't resolved instantly because many fixes require you to restart your PC before coming into effect.



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Internet & Connectivity **1** addresses glitches with your broadband, Wi-Fi and firewall, which may be blocking certain content. If you use Internet Explorer, you can apply a fix that lets you download two files simultaneously (third fix from the bottom). System Tools **2** contains two tabs. The System Tools tab **2** offers fixes for your PC's Administrator, Command Prompt, Registry Editor, Device Manager and Windows Defender. The Advanced System Information tab **2** provides detailed information about your PC, including RAM and screen resolution.


Fix Windows 10 problems in one click



STEP B If you don't find a fix elsewhere, you should check the Additional Fixes section **1**. This includes, for example, the time-saving option of adding Hibernate to the 'Shut down' button **2**. You can also fix disabled Windows 10 notifications **E**, corrupted Desktop icons and Office files that won't open **4**.



The Troubleshooters section **1** doesn't contain Fix buttons. Instead, it uses Windows' built-in Troubleshooter to address common hardware, software and network problems (including those relating to printers, audio recording/playback and Windows Update). For example, if you can't connect to the internet after applying some of the fixes above, click Internet Connections Troubleshooter **2**, then click Next **E**. Windows will begin scanning your PC for possible causes. If it's a driver-related problem, for example, you'll be taken to a website, where you can download and install the appropriate driver.




The Troubleshooters section also has four options at the bottom **1**. These deal with problems relating to printers and misbehaving apps (Mail, Calendar, Settings and Windows Store). To fix any of these, click the relevant Download Troubleshooter link **2**. This will either open a web page containing information about how to resolve the problem, or direct you to a web page from where you can download a relevant file that will fix the problem. Finally, click the Start button **5**, Power, then Restart to apply any pending changes.

Resume broken downloads


What you need: Xtreme Download Manager; Windows 7, 8 or 10 Time required: 20 minutes

f you're downloading a large file (for example, an HD video or a huge setup file) and your internet connection fails midway through the process, you'll need to restart from the beginning. But not if you use Xtreme Download Manager. It's a brilliant, free program that lets you resume a broken download from its last completed point. It also organises your downloaded files by category (documents, videos, programs) and lets you download YouTube videos in a few clicks. We also noticed that it downloads files much faster than using a web browser.



To download and install Xtreme Download Manager (XDM), go to www.snipca.com/18722, click the Windows Installer link 1, then run the setup file 2 (it doesn't contain any adware). When it loads, you'll see the program's features as a slideshow. Keep clicking Next until you need to click 'Launch XDM!' (alternatively, just click Skip). XDM requires a tool called FFmpeg – which automatically detects YouTube videos and gives you the option to download them – so click 'Install Now!' to download it. When that's done, click Close, then OK.






You now need to activate the YouTube Download option, so click Enable, OK, Yes, then OK again. Lastly, you need to integrate XDM with your browser(s) to be able to download files from it. In the Browser Integration window, tick 'Enable Browser Integration' 1 to select all the listed browsers. Now double-click the browser boxes to unselect the ones that you don't use 2. If you use Windows 10, then tick 'Takeover downloads from Microsoft Edge'. Finally, click Apply 3, then click OK (twice).



Close XDM because it will automatically appear the next time you download a file. The program doesn't create a Desktop shortcut; instead it sits in your Taskbar's notification centre. Now download any file as you normally would (by clicking its relevant 'Download' link). Whereas previously the file would immediately start downloading within your browser, you'll now see a New Download window 1, with three options. Click Download Now 2 to begin. You'll see its progress as a percentage, along with three options below – Hide, Preview and Pause.



If the download is interrupted for any reason (for example, if your internet connection fails or you cancel the download by clicking Pause), the New Download window will disappear. Unlike browsers, XDM saves your broken download to its most recent point and lets you resume it. Once your connection returns, open your Taskbar's notification area, and launch XDM 1. Now click the Incomplete section 2, select the file you were downloading 3, then click the Play button 4 to resume downloading it. After that's done, you'll see the option to open the file or open its parent folder.



All your files are still downloaded to your PC's Downloads folder (which is the default). However, XDM has categories that let you quickly locate a particular file. Click the All tab **1**, then click any of the categories **2** to see its relevant downloaded files. Double-click the file you want to open. Right-click any of the files to see a menu **3** with a list of options – including to open the file with a specific program on your PC, copy it, or copy its URL. To delete a downloaded file, simply select it, click the bin icon **4**, then click Yes.

Every time you watch a video on YouTube, XDM saves its link in a small Download Video menu, which appears at the bottom right of your screen. Click the menu to see a list of your watched videos, select the video you want to download, then click Download. You can also convert these downloaded videos (from the default MP4) to another format using XDM. To do that, open XDM, locate the video (in the Videos section) **1**, right-click it, then click Convert Audio/Video. Here, you'll see options to change the converted file's name **2**, its format **3** (XDM supports many popular video formats, including AVI, WMV and MPEG) and its default download location. Click Convert to begin.






By default, XDM also saves the links STEP of YouTube videos you watch on other websites (such as Facebook) to the bottom-right Download Video menu. To stop this happening, click the '+' button at the bottom left of XDM 1 to see the New Download window. Now type the website name (for example, www.facebook.com) in the address field 2, click the More button 3, then click 'Don't capture downloads from this address'. The Settings buttons 4 has useful options. For example, if you're downloading a large file and want to automatically shut down your PC after it has finished, select Advanced on the left, tick 'Shutdown computer after download completes', then click Save.

Stop your router being hacked

What you need: Avast Free Antivirus 2016; Any version of Windows (XP to 10) Time required: 30 minutes


A vast's latest free antivirus (2016) is the first version to come with a home-network scanner. This scans your router and any connected devices (for example, PCs, tablets, phones, printers and scanners), keeping them safe from hackers. It also lets you find and update obsolete drivers on your PC, disable unsafe browser add-ons and create a rescue disk to fix a corrupted PC. Another new feature is a built-in password manager that lets you securely store your passwords within Avast.




To download Avast Free Antivirus 2016, go to www. avast.com, scroll down the page and click the blue Free Download button Delow Free Antivirus Essential. Now run the downloaded setup file 2, then click Install. When the program loads, click Continue twice, then click the 'No, I don't want to protect my Android phone' link at the bottom. Avast 2016's new Smart Scan runs a quick, general check diagnosing seven PC problem areas – including viruses, outdated software and network threats. Click Run Smart Scan to start the process.

In this new version of its software Avast has redesigned the interface. To return to the main screen at any time, click the Avast logo 1. The program has four categories along the top – each containing a number of options. For example, to run a detailed scan of your PC's router and internet connection, click Scan 2, then click 'Scan for network threats' 3. This checks all the devices connected to your home network. Click Resolve and follow the steps to fix any problems.





After the scan, you'll see ticks beside those areas where no problems were found **1** and crosses beside those that need fixing **2**. Click 'Resolve all' **3**. You'll now see more detailed information about the problems detected; click Resolve to fix them. If your PC is running slowly, for example, then Avast may suggest downloading its (paid-for) PC optimisation tool (Avast Cleanup). Instead, you should close the window, then install and run the free CCleaner (www.snipca. com/18760), which does the same job.




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Your PC's security can also be compromised by programs that have not been updated and unsafe browser add-ons. Go to the main screen, click Scan, then 'Scan for outdated software'. Click the Update button **1** beside any flagged up as out of date. Now click the Software Updater Settings link **2**, tick 'Allow update of system-wide products for administrators only', then click OK. This will notify you about programs that need updating. Now go to the main screen, click Scan, then click 'Scan for browser add-ons'. You'll see options to disable any unsafe add-ons following the scan.




Another new feature is the ability to create a rescue disk (USB or CD), which you can use to scan and fix your PC if it becomes corrupted. First, insert a blank USB stick (over 500MB) or a blank CD into your PC. Next, click Tools on the main screen, then Rescue Disk. Select the inserted device in the dropdown menu **1**, click Create Rescue Disk **2**, select your inserted drive **3**, then click 'Install on USB' **1**. The process can take up to 30 minutes; click OK when it's finished. Now if you suspect your PC has become corrupted, restart it, insert the rescue drive, and press the relevant key to enter your PC's Boot Menu. Next, go to the Boot section, select the rescue disk drive and press Enter to scan and fix your PC.



To use Avast's new password manager click the Passwords section in the main section, then click Overview. This will check the passwords saved in your default browser and warn you of any weak and compromised ones 2. Click those boxes to see which accounts those passwords relate to. Next, click 'Activate for free' 2. This lets you create a master password that safeguards your other passwords. Click Continue, type (and retype) your master password (ensuring it has a mix of upper- and lower-case letters and numbers), then click Create Main Password.

Now click the 'Install extension' link below your default browser (Avast supports Chrome, Internet Explorer, Firefox and Opera). That browser will now open. Click the Enable Extension link within it. The next time you log into any website within that browser, you'll see the option to save your password to Avast. To access these saved passwords, click the Passwords section in Avast's main screen, then click Passwords. You'll see all your saved accounts listed. Click an account, and you can copy its password 1 and paste it into the website login page. If you forget an account's password, click the eye icon 2, then enter your master password.


Download Google Maps to use offline

What you need: Android device Time required: 10 minutes


Google Maps for Android now lets you download areas of maps to use offline. This is particularly useful if you're travelling abroad because it lets you receive step-by-step directions without a mobile network. Depending on the size and nature of the area, downloaded maps can take up a few hundred MB, so only download them when you're likely to need them. Try to download maps using a Wi-Fi network to ensure a speedier download and to save mobile data. The maps are automatically deleted after 30 days.




STEP Now open Google Maps, type the name of the area you want to download offline (for example, Canary Wharf), then tap the relevant autosuggest option to see that area. Pinch or expand your screen to select the precise area you want to download for offline use. Next, tap the 'x' in the search field at the top (to clear the field), type ok maps into it 1. then tap the Search icon 2.



STEP If your selected area is more 2 then 50km by 50km, you'll see a message telling you to zoom into a smaller area. After doing that, vou'll see a notification about how much space the downloaded map will take up and the available space on your device 1. You can zoom in and out of this area and move to the left or right. When you're happy with your selection, tap Download 2. name your offline map, then tap Save.

NAVIGATION Send directions from your PC to your phone




NETWORK SOLUTION Restore Windows 10's broken internet connection

I updated my PC to Windows 10 a few weeks back. It did take some getting used to, but I can now say with some confidence that I don't miss Windows 8.1 at all. However, one problem has plagued me since upgrading – my internet connection keeps cutting out whenever I boot up my PC. I noticed this when I opened the Windows Store and saw an 'error code', which I copied and pasted into Google to find a fix.

If you're having problems connecting your PC to the internet and your broadband connection is working fine, open the Windows Store. If you see a 'The error code is 0x80072EFD, in case you need it' message at the bottom, then this is how to restore your connection.

First, try following the steps outlined by Microsoft here: www.snipca.com/ 18833, which worked for me. But I've subsequently found another simpler 10-second fix. Press the Windows key+R to open the Run dialogue box, type inetcpl.cpl into it, then press Enter. Now click the Connections tab, then click the 'LAN settings' button at the bottom. Next, tick 'Automatically detect settings' at the top, and untick 'Use a proxy server for your LAN' in the 'Proxy server' section (see screenshot above



right). Finally, click OK twice and you'll notice your connection will have been restored.

Save precious storage space

Most phones and tablets come with only 16GB of storage space, which isn't a lot when you have to fit in an operating system. Aside from that, photos and videos are the main storage hogs. Google Photos (www. snipca.com/18781) - our favourite photo and video backup service - has now added a useful option that lets you set the app to automatically delete media files from your device that are older than 30 days and have already been backed up.

To do this, open the app, tap the three lines at the top left, then tap Settings at the bottom. Next, tap the new 'Free up device storage' option. The app will now find all your device's media files saved to Google Photos and tell you how much space can be freed up by deleting them. Tap Delete, then Delete again to do that. Google says this feature will be added to the iOS app 'soon'.

ANDROID & iOS **Use Google's improved** voice-search tools

Google's search app (Android: www.snipca. com/18782; iOS: www. snipca.com/18783) has added a number of new features to its ever-expanding arsenal. The app was always good at providing answers to basic questions. For example, you could always tap the app's mic icon, then ask 'How old is Jeremy

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Clarkson?' and get the answer (55).

But now, the type of questions (and answers) that the app can deal with has been expanded. For example, you can ask the app superlative questions, such as 'Who are the tallest Liverpool players?' and get Liverpool players listed according to their height (tallest first). Ask 'What are the most populated cities in the UK?' to see a similar type of list (see screenshot above). You can also ask questions about a particular point in time. For example, try asking 'What songs did The Beatles record in 1969?'.

iOS Add the iCloud Drive app to your home screen

Use Firefox's reading mode

Mozilla has launched a Firefox browser app for iOS devices. If you currently use Firefox on your PC or on an Android device, the app will sync your bookmarks and browsing history across all your devices. The new app also has a useful reading mode that strips away adverts and web videos and lets you customise your reading experience by tweaking the interface and font.

Install and open the app (www.snipca. com/18784), swipe through the introductory screens, then tap 'Sign in to Firefox' and log in (if you already have a Firefox account). Alternatively, tap Start Browsing to skip the log in. The app has five icons across the browser bar at the top. The first contains tiles of websites you frequently visit; the second (star) icon contains websites you've bookmarked; the clock icon lists your browsing history; the cloud icon contains websites you've bookmarked on another device; and the book icon contains your reading list.

WINDOWS 10

Use improved version of Notepad

All versions of Windows come with Notepad, but the tool has always been very basic. For example, it only lets you undo your last action (not actions previous to that), it doesn't provide a word count, you can't search for words within your file and you can't create another Notepad file within the same window. If you have Windows 10, you can use the new, free app Notepad Next to do all of these things.

To download it, open the Windows Store, search for notepad next, download it, then click Open to launch the program. You'll see large buttons for common actions listed at the top and your line, word and character counts at the bottom. To open a new file within the same window, simply click the 'New file' icon (see screenshot below).




WINDOWS 10 Hack Edge to use with WhatsApp Web

Previously, we showed you how to sync your WhatsApp

Messenger phone conversations to your PC browser using WhatsApp Web (see Workshop, Issue 445, page 42). This feature only works in Chrome, Firefox, Opera and Safari. However, if you use Windows 10, there's an easy hack you can carry out so you can use WhatsApp Web with Edge, Microsoft's new browser.

Open Edge and go to web.whatsapp. com. Ignore the message saying you can only use the supported browsers (instead of Edge) and click Edge's More button (the three dots at the top right). Next, click F12 Developer Tools. A new section

WINDOWS 7, 8, 10 Create a panorama using Photo Gallery



You usually need an advanced photoediting program

and a degree of technical know-how to merge adjacent views into a panoramic photo. However, Microsoft's free program Photo Gallery can do this for you with excellent results. For convenience, save the photos you want to merge (in the order you want them to appear – from left to right) on your Desktop.

Photo Gallery is part of Microsoft's Windows Essentials package. To download it, go to www.snipca.com/ 18850, click the purple 'Get it now' button, run the setup file, then click

(with nine tabs) will open. Click the Emulation tab, change the User Agent String dropdown menu to Google Chrome (see screenshot below), then close the section. Immediately you'll see a QR code on your screen.

WINDOWS 7, 8, 10 Cycle through PC locations in Command Prompt

Command Prompt lets you specify which PC location (file or folder)

Open Command Prompt (using the search field). By default, it opens in C:\Users\your name. Keep pressing the Tab key to cycle through your locations until you reach the one you want, then type your command.

Make Office Better

OFFICE Check whether add-ins are destabilising your program

You're probably familiar with browser add-ons that extend the functionality of Chrome and Firefox. Office programs (Word, Excel and PowerPoint) have similar tools called 'add-ins' that let you add extra features. To use add-ins, click the Insert tab, then click Store in the 'Add-in' sections at the top. Like browser add-ons, Office add-ins can sometimes make your programs unstable. So if, for example, a program is loading slowly or crashing frequently, there's an easy way to check whether an add-in you recently installed is to blame.

To do this, hold down the Ctrl key, then launch the faulty program. You'll see a pop-up prompting you to launch the program in Safe Mode – click Yes. The program will now open minus any add-ins. If it opens without problems and works fine, then you know the add-ins are responsible for any instabilities. To remove the faulty add-in, simply reopen the program, click the Insert tab, then click 'My Apps' (in the 'Add-ins' section). Now right-click the add-in, click Remove, then Remove again.

Create your own 'cover pages'

If you tend to lay out the first page of your Word document in a particular way (your name, address, an image or graphics, for example), then there's an easy way to



Change the 'read' status of your emails

Whenever you receive a new email in Outlook, the number next to your Inbox at the top left will increase by one and the new email is formatted in bold in your Reading Pane. By default, when you click to read this new email in your Reading Pane, it won't lose its bold formatting and the

number next to your Inbox won't decrease. It's only when you click another email (an older one, for example) that the formatting changes and the number decreases – indicating that the email has been 'read'. It's easy to change this default setting so that Outlook shows an email as 'read' when you click it.


save this template as a 'cover page' that you can reuse whenever you want. The easiest way to do this is by using Word's Cover Page option. If you click the Insert tab, then the Cover Page dropdown menu at the top left, you'll see a selection of cover pages that you can click to add. It's easy to create and add your own page to this group.



ONENOTE Create Desktop shortcuts for your notebooks and sections

If you use a particular notebook or section within OneNote a lot, then you should create a Desktop shortcut for it for easy access. To create a



Click File at the top left, then Options. Next, click Mail on the left, the Reading Pane button, then tick the 'Mark items as read when viewed in the Reading Pane' box (see screenshot). Type in the field below to set how many seconds after clicking the email you want the formatting and number to change. Click OK twice.



shortcut for a notebook, click the notebook dropdown menu at the top left of OneNote, right-click the notebook you want, then click 'Copy Link to Notebook'. Likewise, to create a shortcut for a notebook section, right-click the relevant section tab at the top, then click 'Copy Link to Section' (see screenshot above).

Now right-click any blank area on your Desktop, move your cursor to New in the menu, then click Shortcut. Click inside the location field and press Ctrl+V to paste your copied shortcut link, then click Next. By default, the shortcut is named New Internet Shortcut, so rename it, then click Finish. Now, whenever you double-click this shortcut, it'll take you straight to your desired notebook or section.

Secret Tips For...

Android 6.0 (Marshmallow)

Find apps that slow you down, customise Quick Settings and play a secret game

Translate with a single tap

Come across text in a foreign language that you don't understand? Simply install the free Google Translate app (www. snipca.com/18486) and then, exclusive to Marshmallow users, you'll have the ability to translate on the go. Just tap, hold and drag to select the text, as you would when copying and pasting, then tap Translate in the pop-up menu for your translation (see screenshot right). If the option doesn't appear, tap the three dots to see more options – you'll find Translate there.

Customise Quick Settings

Swipe down from the top with two fingers and you'll open Android's Quick Settings pane. That's nothing new, but the ability to customise it is. With Quick Settings open tap and hold the cog icon for a few seconds until the 'Congrats! System UI Tuner has been added to Settings' message appears. Now tap your home button, followed by Settings, and then the newly added System UI Tuner, followed by Quick Settings. Next, tap 'Add tile' to add icons, or remove one by dragging and dropping it on to Delete. You can also rearrange an icon's position by dragging and dropping.

Enable status bar battery percentage

Want to see at a glance how much battery life you have left? Follow the previous tip to enable System UI Tuner then, in the System UI Tuner page within Settings, swipe the 'Show embedded battery percentage' switch to its On position.

Find the memory hogs

Apps that use a lot of memory can slow down your device – and Marshmallow has a new option that makes it easy to find these. Tap Settings followed by Memory to see the list, which by default shows the biggest users of memory over

Enable Developer Options

Android's biggest secret weapon is a bunch of hidden tools known as Developer Options. The feature isn't itself new but every Android user should enable it, and there are a few new options unique to Marshmallow.

Tap Settings followed by 'About phone'. Next, tap 'Build number' seven times in quick succession and you'll see a 'You are now a developer!' message. Now go to Settings and tap 'Developer options'. There's loads to explore here but two great options are 'Aggressive Wi-Fi to Mobile handover' and, if you're on an unlimited data plan, 'Mobile data always active'.

Enable both and everything you do online will feel quicker, because your phone will flit between Wi-Fi and 3G/4G when one or the other's signal is low. Also set all the animation scale options (see screenshot) to make every window and menu appear instantly. the past three hours. Tap the down arrow to change this time period, or to order the list by overall use tap the menu (three dots) then tap 'Sort by max. use'. Tap an app to see more information, then tap the 'i' icon for even more options – including the ability to uninstall the app.

Use Doze to save your battery

Doze is a significant new feature of Marshmallow, putting all apps into a kind of stasis to stop them from sapping your battery. That's great, but usually this can also prevent apps from acting in the way you want - even suppressing notifications you consider important. Doze lets you control which apps are affected. Tap Settings, followed by Battery, then the menu at the top right (three dots) and choose 'Battery optimisation'. Now tap the down arrow alongside 'Not optimized' and choose 'All apps'. Now just tap an app you want to exclude, followed by the 'Don't optimise' button, and then Done.

Unlock a secret game

Google typically includes a hidden feature in each big new Android version, and Marshmallow's Easter egg is a proper treat - a full, playable version of the popular Flappy Bird game. To unlock it, tap Settings then tap 'About phone'. Now tap the

'Android version' heading three times – an M logo will appear. Tap this M once to change it to the Android Marshmallow logo. Tap this logo several times then stop, and tap and hold it. If you get it right, the game appears. Now tap once to play, then keep tapping to keep the android airborne. Happy flapping!

What's All the Fuss About...



Surround Wi-Fi

There's a new way to guarantee a reliable connection from cellar to attic

What is it?

A term coined by US router company Luma (https://getluma.com) to describe a new form of Wi-Fi. The technology connects several routers around your home to extend coverage, similar to how wireless speaker systems like Sonos play music in different rooms.

How does it work?

You plug a Luma router into your modem, then open its app on your phone or tablet to find out the best place to position others. These connect with the first router in order to 'surround' your home in a blanket of Wi-Fi, helping to eliminate dead spots and the need to re-connect as you walk from room to room.

Is it different to using Wi-Fi range extenders?

Yes. Range extenders aren't routers – they simply pick up then repeat the Wi-Fi signal of your router. By contrast, each router operating through Surround Wi-Fi

is connected to each other, creating what is known as a 'mesh' network.

Luma is very keen that you don't mix up the two. On its website the company says that its routers have "very little in common with today's extenders". Now *don't* ask again.

OK, but are they *better* than range extenders?

That remains to be seen. We're certainly in no hurry to bin our range extenders, having seen some impressive results from them recently. Our sister title *Web User* tested 11 extenders in July, awarding Gold to the Netgear Nighthawk AC1900 (currently £140 from Amazon: www. snipca.com/18648). Silver went to the Linksys RE6500 (£70 from Amazon: www.snipca.com/18687).

But extenders aren't perfect, are they?

No. The main drawback is that they effectively halve your bandwidth because they rebroadcast the signal in both directions between the router and the computer. This affects the streaming speed of music and video, but not simple web browsing.

So should l ditch my extender? Not just yet, because the Luma routers are available only in the US. And in any case, their appeal lies in more than simply boosting your Wi-Fi. Like Google's new OnHub router (https://on.google. com/hub), the Luma devices make it much easier to control your Wi-Fi from one place. Using the app you can set parental controls, block people trying to access your Wi-Fi, and see which devices in your home are connected to the web (see screenshot below left). You can even see what website someone else on the network is visiting, which may lead to some family fall-outs. We hope it's as easy as Luma makes it look in this video: www.snipca.com/18649.

Do Luma's routers look nice? We think they're more pleasing on the eye than most of the black boxes sitting in our living rooms, but you can judge for yourself in the main photo (above). As you can see, they are literally jumping for joy at the prospect of bathing your home in Wi-Fi. Luma's slick marketing will try to convince you that the routers are as exciting as a new laptop, phone or tablet, which is just as well because they cost about the same.

But how expensive exactly? Well, they're not cheap – a pack of three costs \$499. That converts to around £330, but as with most tech they will probably cost more in the UK. If so, most people will stick with their uglier – but cheaper – range extenders.

Stop & Control WNDOWS UPDATES

Microsoft has been causing chaos recently with its flawed updates for Windows. Jane Hoskyn explains

how to regain control of your PC

indows Update are two words guaranteed to strike fear into the heart of any PC user. You've already spent what seems like half your life staring at the message "Installing update 1 of 128... Installing update 2 of 128" before you can actually use your computer. Then there's a second wave of updates to fix all the bugs in the first wave.

WHAT YOU CAN DO

- Find out what Microsoft has downloaded behind your back
- Delete all update junk in Windows 7, 8/8.1 and 10
- Uninstall the Windows apps that Microsoft brought back
- Reinstall programs you lost in the Windows 10 update
- Configure Windows Update to block unwanted updates – even in Windows 10

Microsoft has now surpassed itself with Windows 10's first big update, which has horrified many users. The automatic update – codenamed Threshold 2 and now known as the somewhat more prosaic 'November update' – arrived on the 12th of that month. An early Christmas present for your shiny new operating system (OS), you may think. But once the wrapping was off and the update installed, many users found they lost far more than they gained.

Has Microsoft gone too far?

As we reported in Issue 463 (News, page 6), the November update gave with one hand and took away with the other. The stuff it gave wasn't what you wanted, and the stuff it took away included third-party software you'd relied on for years. Microsoft's arrogance was astonishing. Perhaps it felt Christmas needed a goodwill antidote? Of course, Microsoft's impertinence is nothing new. The company has spent months funnelling unwanted gigabytes of Windows 10 files on to Windows 7 and 8/8.1 computers. And while Windows Update problems go back to 2008 and beyond (see the SevenForums site, www.snipca.com/18799), it seems to be getting much, much worse. At least you could switch off automatic updates in Windows 7 and 8/8.1; you can't in Windows 10, unless you disable Windows Update completely (tip: don't!).

You don't have to be a conspiracy theorist to see where this is heading. It looks to us like a warm-up for Microsoft's grand plan: automatically installing Windows 10 on all Windows 7 and 8/8.1 PC's next year. Now we don't *know* that for sure, but all signs currently point that way.

Over the next few pages we'll show you how to fight back and regain control over Windows Update, whatever version of the OS you're using.

WHAT HAS WINDOWS UPDATE DONE TO YOUR PC?

The case of the missing programs

The apparent deletion of third-party programs from users' computers may be the most disgraceful side-effect of Windows Update we've ever seen.

Actually, "side-effect" is too polite a term. This was an assault on Microsoft's rivals. The programs weren't removed for compatibility reasons either – users who've reinstalled the tools since the November update have found that they run without a hitch.

Expunged programs included CPU-Z and HWMonitor (both made by CPUID: www.cpuid.com/softwares.html); Speccy (by Piriform, maker of CCleaner: www. piriform.com) and spyware-killer SpyBot Search & Destroy (https://www.safernetworking.org) – all big *Computeractive* favourites. See the full list of missing programs on page 6 of Issue 463. For the full furious fallout from other users, see online forum Reddit (www.snipca. com/18800).

Moreover, there were no release notes or explanations at all with the November update, just a self-congratulatory blog (www.snipca.com/18853).

Find your missing programs

Now for some good news. We've found the programs you thought you'd lost. They're no longer fully installed, so you can't run them from 'All apps' or by searching from the Start menu. But their essential remnants are stashed in a system folder, created by Microsoft during the November update.

The folder is easy to find. Open File

Explorer, hover over 'Windows (C:)' in the list of folders and drives on the left, then click the tiny arrow that appears. You'll now see folders it contains, including Program Files, Users, Windows – and a new one called 'Windows.old'. Click this folder and you'll see another Users folder, where you should find the "old" programs Microsoft decided to shuffle off into obscurity.


It is possible to recover programs from 'Windows.old', but we'd recommend installing them afresh instead. This way, you can be sure you're getting the latest versions, and that Microsoft hasn't interfered with any settings. We'll go into more detail on replacing missing or hidden programs later in this feature.

Find out if there's Windows 10 junk on your Windows 7 or 8 PC Windows 10's November update is only

the latest Windows Update scandal to infuriate you this year. Following an uninvited visit from Windows Update in September, millions of Windows 7 and 8/8.1 users found a whopping hidden system folder containing Windows 10 files. And we mean whopping – the files took up 6GB of space, which is bigger than many portable hard drives.

As mentioned in our report on the first 100 days on Windows 10 (Issue 461), the folder was merely a pre-emptive gift from Microsoft, containing files you might need one day. It didn't do anything other than hog space and slow down users' PCs. Just like the November update, this was an automatic, uninvited download. It arrived whether you'd registered your interest in Windows 10 or not.

That's so arrogant it actually made

us laugh, but it's seriously damaging behaviour by Microsoft. Older PCs, especially those running Windows 7, may be unable to cope with a sudden influx of data. Even if your PC is in great condition and you do intend to upgrade to Windows 10 at some stage, you don't need these pre-emptive downloads – all the files you need are online (www.snipca.com/18803), and our sister site Alphr has full instructions for downloading and installing them (www. snipca.com/18804).

To see if you've got the rogue folder, first you'll have to un-hide system folders in Windows Explorer. You can do this via the Control Panel. Click 'Appearance and Personalization' and then, under Folder Options, click 'Show hidden files and folders'. In the window that opens, click the View tab, scroll down the list under 'Advanced settings' and click 'Show hidden files, folders, and drives', then click OK (see screenshot bottom left, page 51). If you see the folder '\$Windows.~BT' in your C: drive, you've got the pointless Windows 10 files.

Removing the folder and its contents is no easy business, because Windows Update downloads it again the next time it runs. See our Workshop in Issue 460 for help with removing it.

YOU CAN'T CUT EDGE

While Windows Update was busy nicking users' favourite programs, it was also restoring their least favourite apps. No 'Do you want this app back?', no OK button, no nothing. Just a great big automatic waste of people's time.

According to several apoplectic Reddit contributors (www. snipca.com/18801), the November update restored default apps – including the muchdisliked Edge browser, and unwanted game

apps such as Xbox (see screenshot) – that people had spent time and effort getting rid of in their supposedly customisable new OS.

The update also reverted key PC settings to Microsoft's defaults, overriding any changes you'd made. Have you spent time changing your file associations, for example setting PDFs to open in Acrobat



Reader instead of the dreaded Edge? Bad luck. Windows Update has changed the default back to Edge – which is now your default browser again, too.

Some reports suggest that these annoyances are mere bugs, and they'll be fixed by incremental automatic updates. That remains to be seen, so keep an eye on our News pages for the latest.


REMOVE ALL WINDOWS UPDATE JUNK

Obliterate Windows Update leftovers

Littering PCs with junk isn't a new hobby for Windows Update. It's been at it for years. If you've been using Windows 7 on the same PC for a while, there could be several gigabytes of useless Windows Update leftovers clogging up your hard drive.

It's not just temporary files, caches and the like. Windows actually keeps copies of all installed updates from Windows Update, even after it's installed newer updates or newer versions.

To see how much update junk you've collected, and to obliterate it for good, use Disk Cleanup. This useful and often

overlooked tool is built into 7, 8/8.1 and 10, and works in the same way in all versions. Better still, it's recently been updated to include a new Windows Update Cleanup tool that deletes old updates your OS doesn't need.

To get started, type disk cleanup into Start and click Disk Cleanup in the results. In Windows 7 and 8/8.1, the tool automatically starts scanning your local hard drive (C:). In Windows 10, you'll need to choose the drive ('disk') you want to scan. When the scan is done, you'll see a list of CCleaner-style tick-boxes that represent dispensable Windows junk.

There's no 'Windows Update Cleanup' box – until you create one

with a couple more steps. Click the 'Clean up system files' button (you'll need admin privileges on the PC), and the initial scan will run again, but it'll be more thorough and take longer. Eventually the tick-box window will open again – and this time you'll find a

Windows Update Cleanup box included (scroll down to see it).

To its right you'll see how much space old, obsolete updates are taking up on your computer. On our relatively clean, recently wiped Windows 7 PC, old updates were already taking up 1.97GB (see screenshot, page 52 bottom right).

Tick the box, along with any other junk you want to clear (some are pre-ticked, such as 'Temporary files'), then click OK. Restart your PC for the clean to complete.

Delete apps Windows Update brought back

It's annoying – even a little scary – to delete a program or file, restart your computer and find that the "deleted" item is still there. This is the kind of behaviour we often see from browser hijackers and other dodgy files, and we recommend using the powerful free tool AdwCleaner (www.snipca. com/18811) to get rid of them.

Microsoft gave no hint whatsoever that its November update would automatically restore Microsoft apps you'd uninstalled, so their return was disconcerting.

Unfortunately, there's no 'Ctrl+Z'-style way to undo Windows Update (oh, if only) and restore the customisations you'd set but Microsoft wiped out. For example, to get rid of the rebounding default apps you'll just have to uninstall them again.

Some Microsoft apps, including Office, Money, Skype, Windows Media Player and News can be uninstalled simply by right-clicking them in the 'All apps' list and then clicking Uninstall. This should also work for apps that were pre-installed by your PC maker.

Other Microsoft apps – such as Mail, Messaging and Xbox – need a more persuasive approach. You have a couple of options. First, use the free portable tool 10AppsManager (www.snipca. com/18830). We mentioned the

program in our last Cover Feature (Issue 463), but unfortunately it seems to have disappeared from the site we mentioned on that occasion – the apps directory UpToDown (www.snipca. com/18831). Worry not – it still exists and still works. Download it from its developer, The Windows Club (www. snipca.com/18830). Scroll down the page and click the blue Download File button.

Save and extract the ZIP, then rightclick the program file ('10AppsManager. exe') and select 'Run as administrator'. Click Yes when prompted by Windows.

The simple, square program window contains a grid of Microsoft apps, including some – Xbox, Mail and Calendar – that you can't uninstall by right-clicking in the 'All apps list'. In 10 Apps Manager, click the app you want to remove, then click Yes.

10AppsManager can't remove all built-in apps, however. An even more powerful


CAN YOU LEARN TO LIVE WITH DEFAULT APPS?

Windows Update can't force you to love your default apps, but it can force them to stay on your computer. So should you just learn to live with them? That's what you've been doing for years with the default apps on your iPad, iPhone and Android tablet and phone, after all.

Android lets you uninstall updates and roll back to the original version of a default app (such as Google) and clear its cache and data, but you can't remove the app itself. Apple's iOS lets you do barely anything to its pre-installed Apple apps. You can't even remove the icons from your screen.

By contrast, Windows 10's pre-installed (and now re-installed) apps take up very little space relative to hard-drive size, and their effect on your PC's performance is minimal.

So while Windows Update deserves a slap for putting back apps you didn't want, ultimately it's not a war worth fighting. On your fast, flexible Windows 10 PC, they do very little harm – and one day you may even find one of them useful.



option is to use Windows PowerShell and the Command Prompt (find instructions here: www.snipca. com/18826). Microsoft's TechNet site also has information and tips on using PowerShell with the Command Prompt to get more control over Windows 10 and its updates (www.snipca.com/18878).

But even that strategy won't edge out Edge or drive out Cortana. You could dig deep into Reddit (www.snipca. com/18827) for Registry hacks that may get rid of these irritants, and they may even work. But we'd bet our last tuppence that they'll be back with the next automatic Windows 10 Update.

The only real solution to keeping unwanted Microsoft apps off your PC, at least temporarily, is to tweak your Windows 10 Update settings. We'll show you how in the next few pages.

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BRING BACK THE TOOLS WINDOWS UPDATE REMOVED

Restore programs from Windows.old

As mentioned on page 51, the November update saw Microsoft move some of your favourite programs to the mysterious 'Windows.old' folder.

It is possible to restore programs from this folder. Microsoft hasn't yet updated its site to explain how to do this in Windows 10, just Windows 8.1 (www. snipca.com/18835). Funny how Microsoft is so eager to impose dramatic OS updates but can't update its own website with vital information.


Luckily, the steps used to restore programs in Windows 8.1 seem to work in Windows 10 as well – up to a point. In short, open the Windows.old folder, open Users and then open your username folder. Find your missing program files and copy and paste them back into Program Files or on to your Desktop.

We tried this and found it hit and miss at best. You can't just make a program work again simply by pasting it on to your Desktop. Instead, we recommend emptying the Windows.old folder completely and reinstalling your lost programs from scratch.

Uninstall missing programs first

We recommend reinstalling your missing programs from their developers' sites rather than messing around with Windows system folders. But first, you should completely uninstall them and their leftovers.

Uninstalling previous versions of programs – and their leftover files – is





always a wise move before you install software. But it's especially important in this case, because you have no way of knowing what Windows Update did to the programs it moved.

Install and run the free tool IObit Uninstaller (www.snipca.com/18839), then scroll through its list of your installed programs and plug-ins. If you

spot one of the programs that was kidnapped by Windows Update, click the Uninstall (or 'Quick Uninstall') button next to it. Wait a few moments for the program to be removed.

IObit will then automatically check for leftovers in your Registry. If there are none, you'll see a box saying so. That's it, job done.

If there *are* leftovers, tick the top box in the window that opens (see screenshot bottom left) – this automatically ticks all the sub-boxes as well – and then click Delete to get rid of them all.

Reinstall missing programs from scratch

On page 51 we mentioned some of the programs the November update meddled with – including *Computeractive* favourites Speccy and CPU-Z – and gave links to their developers' sites. In the box on the next page you can find links for all the programs Microsoft removed, along with links for portable versions of the programs if available.

By downloading and installing programs from their makers' sites, you can be sure you're getting the latest (and legitimate) version. You can also see release notes of the kind Microsoft couldn't be bothered to include with the November update, and get help from the developer and other users.

Use portable programs

No-one outside of Microsoft (or perhaps even inside Microsoft) knows what the next big update – codenamed Redstone and due in spring 2016 – will bring. You'd be forgiven for assuming it'll just remove all your reinstalled programs and put back all those unwanted apps – again.

To help ensure the next update makes

you slightly less angry, keep portable versions of the programs Windows Update seems to dislike.

CPU-Z, Speccy, HWMonitor and SpyBot all have portable versions. Find all the download links in the box below. These portable programs can be run directly from the program file (usually an EXE file, which may need to be extracted from a ZIP file first).

You can then copy and move this EXE – or the ZIP, which may include helpful extras such as release notes and help files – to useful storage locations such as a USB stick, external hard drive, Google Drive and more.

USB sticks are the most useful option because they let you run the tools easily and safely on older computers, such as your old XP laptop, without the need to go online.

The main downside of portable programs is that they can't be patched automatically, so you'll need to make sure you're using the latest version. It's also good practice to upload portable program files to the free web tool VirusTotal (www.virustotal.com) to check they're malware-free before you run them.

The upside is that Windows Update can't touch them. The next big Windows 10 update can sweep away as many installed programs as it likes – but it can't take away the portable tools you've stored on your USB.

Make up your mind, Microsoft

In early November Microsoft launched a Media Creation Tool that would let users install the November update manually or save it as an ISO for installing later.

The tool was free to download (www.snipca.com/18877), then Microsoft removed it, frustrating everyone trying our 'Master Windows 10's updated tools' Workshop. A few days later it was back, with Microsoft blaming a bug that changed privacy settings (see 'Question of the Fortnight', page 10).

Installable: 8gadgetpack. net; click blue Download button (ignore the 'Update Drivers Now' button at the top; it's an advert). There are no unwanted extras in the installer. The program adds a configurable gadgets sidebar to Windows 10 (see screenshot; for some reason it thinks we're in New York).

AND THE PROGRAMS WE'VE LOST FOR GOOD... PERHAPS

PCMeter (http://addgadgets.com/ pc_meter). We downloaded this to our Windows 10 PC but it wouldn't run.

Adobe Creative Suite (www.snipca. com/18861). This can still be downloaded from some mirror sites, but it's unlikely to run in Windows 10. Even Mac OS X – the natural home of Adobe's graphics tools – removed Adobe CS from users' computers following "free" OS updates a couple of years ago. This wasn't Microsoft's fault, but Adobe's. Adobe wanted users to switch to the new subscription service, Adobe Creative Cloud (www.snipca. com/18863), instead.


If you've ever lost a very expensive version of Adobe Creative Suite 5 after upgrading a Mac, you'll understand Windows 10 users' fury. Adobe CS is not cheap, and suddenly it's completely useless following an update that gave Windows users no warning of its consequences for certain software.


TAKE BACK CONTROL OF WINDOWS UPDATE

Fix your violated Windows 10 settings

Missing programs, resurrected apps, and unwanted reinstalled drivers are just some of the things you didn't ask for in Windows 10's major update, but you got them anyway. It all suggests that Microsoft wants to crack down on user control – and can leave you feeling that it's not even your computer anymore.

However, it is possible to restore many of the settings affected by November's update. The simplest method is by going to Settings in the Start menu, then clicking System. Click links in the menu on the left to configure items including 'Default apps', 'Notifications and actions' (where you can get rid of unwanted 'tips about Windows') and Display (where you can adjust brightness, text size and so on).





Uninstall unwanted drivers and updates

You can remove any driver that's surplus to your needs in Windows 10 by uninstalling it along with its associated software. Right-click the Start button (Windows 10 logo), then click Device Manager in the list that appears. You'll also find useful system tools such as Command Prompt and Run in this list.

Device Manager contains a list of driver types. Click the little arrows next to each type to see the drivers, then right-click an unwanted driver and click Uninstall. When the uninstall box opens, tick 'Delete the driver software for this device'.

It's just as easy (though potentially risky) to uninstall an unwanted Windows update. Type **installed** into the Start search box and click 'View installed updates'. Here, you'll see a list of updates,

AUTOMATIC UPDATES: FRIEND OR FOE?

Windows 10 was sold to us as a powerfully customisable system. Building on the flexibility of Windows 8.1, Windows 10 would supposedly give you the freedom and tools to create the OS you'd always wanted.

The November update did bring good news for users of the Enterprise and Education editions of Windows 10, who now have more freedom to configure and defer Windows updates (www.snipca.com/18870).

But the rest of us have less control over Windows Update than ever before. Is Microsoft's ultimate goal to turn your PC into its eyes, ears and voice, Big Brotherstyle, with no third-party upstart tools getting in the way?

FRUSTRATING BUT SAFE

Microsoft's apparent control-grab isn't all bad. One of its more extreme critics on Reddit (www.snipca.com/ 18864) suggests: "Just disable the Windows Update process and be done with it". Don't do that! Seriously, don't.

Windows 10, and we'll explain a simple option on page 58. But please approach all these hacks with caution.

Windows Update can be a pain in the neck, but it's far more useful alive than dead. Its main job is to keep you safe by patching security holes, thereby protecting you from malware. If enough people switch off Windows Update, cybercriminals could use their unpatched PCs to create a botnet, spreading malware worldwide.

Let's face it, an uninstallable 'Groove Music' app is annoying, but it's a lot easier to live with than the consequences of switching off the automatic security updates that keep you safer in Windows 10 than ever before.

including security updates and the November update. You may need to scroll to the right of the window to see the installation dates. You can uninstall an update by right-clicking it and clicking Uninstall.

Note that security updates are vital for keeping your PC safe, so please don't uninstall them unless you have hard evidence for doing so.

Hide unwanted updates from Windows Update

As you'll have gathered by now, the trouble with removing unwanted items is that they'll bounce back with the next big Windows update.

However, you can "hide" certain items from incremental updates, which happen regularly between the big updates like the one we saw in November. You can do this using a tool made by none other than Microsoft itself. Go to the relevant Microsoft Support page (www.snipca.com/18868), click the blue 'Download the "Show or hide updates" troubleshooter package now' link towards the bottom of the page, and then open the file, which has the catchy name 'wushowhide.diagcab'.

The program window opens automatically. Click Next to scan for installed updates, then click 'Hide updates' and tick any you want to "hide" from Windows Update.

Now for the bad news. This tool was first launched during the Insider Preview testing phase, and while it still exists and works, it's not as effective as it was. Now, if you hide an item, it will be blocked from reinstalling - but only until, in Microsoft's words, "a new driver or updated fix is available". So you can hide unwanted updates - but the next incremental update may force them back on to your PC.

Take back driver control

In Windows 8/8.1 and more so in 7, you have plenty of control over the drivers vou update - which drivers, where to download them from and when to install them. In fact in Windows 7 the default setting was (and still is) 'No, let me choose what to do - Never install driver software from Windows Update'.

Windows 10, by stark contrast, sets all drivers to install automatically by default.



Your only alternative to full automatic driver updates is to switch them off altogether, which we think is meanspirited of Microsoft and potentially hazardous. To do this, type installation in the Start search box and click 'Change device installation settings' (same goes for Windows 7 and 8/8.1). In Windows 10, you're then asked: 'Do you want to automatically download manufacturers' apps and custom icons?'. 'Yes (recommended)' is selected by default; no surprises there. The only other option is 'No (your device might not work)'. Click it, and then click Save Changes.

That's it - all or nothing. If you change your mind, repeat the steps above and click 'Yes (recommended)' to restore

The screenshots at the bottom of the page compare the default download options in Windows 7 (left) and Windows 10 (right). We've not changed any options, typifying the differences between update settings throughout Windows 7 and Windows 10.

Tweak Windows Update without disabling it

You can switch off Windows Update in Windows 10, as suggested by our angry friend in Reddit (see box page 57). Here's how, if you really want to. Open the Control Panel, type

services in the search box and then click 'View local services'. In the box that opens, scroll to Windows Update, right-click it and click Properties. Then open the 'Startup type' dropdown box, click Disabled and then OK.

That's it - you won't get any more updates, and your PC will turn into a playground for cybercriminals. At the risk of repeating ourselves, we strongly advise against doing this. Instant, automatic security updates are a huge advantage of Windows 10.

Instead, tweak Windows Update to give you a little more control. In the 'Startup type' dropdown box, select 'Automatic (Delayed start)' to ensure your PC doesn't suddenly do a restart while you're in the middle of something.

Alternatively, open Settings, click 'Update & Security', 'Advanced options', and then select 'Notify to schedule restart' from the dropdown box. Next time an update is due (major or otherwise), you'll get an alert offering you to change to delay restart, so you've got time to save your work.

You may notice an option to 'Defer upgrades' in Settings - this is only available to members of the Insider Program. You can still join the free Program (https://insider.windows.com) to get beta updates in advance, to defer your updates - and to get the chance to tell Microsoft exactly what you think.

Stay mentally fit with brain -training apps

As new research shows how apps can help you stay mentally fit, **Daniel Booth** recommends five you should try

We all know that as we get older, we should try to stay physically active. Well, the same is true of our brains. We need to keep challenging that ageing grey matter to make sure our mental alertness doesn't deteriorate.

Do computer games count as mental exercise? Some medical professionals have always been sceptical, saying that the alleged benefits, such as boosting IQ and preventing dementia, have been exaggerated by game companies in order to fuel a multi-billion pound industry.

But new evidence suggests that games really *are* good for you. In a study funded by the Alzheimer's Society, researchers at the Institute of Psychiatry, Psychology and Neuroscience at King's College London found that brain-training games could have "significant" benefits for older people carrying out everyday tasks.

The research involved almost 7,000 adults aged over 50 and claims to be the first to evaluate the impact of computerbased brain training on how well people can perform their daily activities (read more on the Alzheimer's Society's website: www.snipca.com/18763).

Inspired by this research, here we recommend five of the best brainboosting apps. None, sadly, is completely free - you have to pay to unlock extra levels and games. But you can typically play for long enough before being forced to pay to judge whether it's worth the money.


Probably the best known brain-training app, Lumosity is now played by 70 million people. 

In Windows 10 you can create separate accounts for everyone in the family. **Barry Collins** reveals why this is such a great idea

Before Windows 10, most PCs were operated from a single user account. That means the computer belongs to one person, and one person only.

Windows 10 now allows every family member (and friends, colleagues or people visiting for the weekend) to set up their own dedicated account. Each separate account owner can have their own private email account, document folders, Desktop wallpaper, Windows apps and customised Start menu.

It's not the same as setting up virtual PCs – which is where you are effectively creating an entirely new system inside the same physical hardware – but the benefits are similar and it's much quicker and easier to do. Here we'll show you how.

Set up accounts for family members

When you're setting up a new account, Windows 10 makes a distinction between family members and 'other' users. The main reason for this is to allow adults to monitor their children's accounts: giving them permission to download apps, set times they can use the computer and so on. But you don't have to have children,

or even grandchildren, to find this feature useful.

If you're in a household of adults and grown-up children, it doesn't really matter which option you choose. Your main decision will be whether you want to use a Microsoft account or not.

If you'd rather not, you can set up a completely local account. This means you won't be able to sync settings, bookmarks and so on across different PCs using your Microsoft account, and it can make buying Windows Store apps more tricky. But if you're determined not to give Microsoft your email address and other details, choose 'Add someone else to this PC' under 'other users'.

If other family members are happy to use a Microsoft account, open Settings from the Start menu and choose the Accounts option. Click the 'Family & other users' tab on the left-hand side of the window that appears, then click 'Add a family member'. You'll now be asked whether you're setting up an account for an adult or a child, and prompted to enter the new user's email address. You'll then be asked to set up a Microsoft account (if you don't already have one registered to that email address), then follow the on-screen instructions.

Turn a standard account into an admin account

By default, the person who first set up the PC will be the 'administrator' and any secondary accounts added will be given 'standard' status.

Standard account holders have fewer privileges: they can't install most software without the administrator's password; they can't view the personal folders (documents, photos and so on) of other account holders; and they have limited access to PC settings.

The original idea was based on letting kids use their parents' computers without creating havoc, but these standard account privileges may seem somewhat restrictive for those of us who just want to share our computers with family members. For example, if you want to install a program when the administrator is out of the house, you can't.

Thankfully, you can upgrade a trusted secondary account holder to administrator status. The original administrator needs to do this. Go to Settings, Accounts, then 'Family & other users' and select the relevant accountholder's name. Click 'Change account type' and select Administrator.

Add a temporary guest account

If you have friends or extended family members coming to stay, you can set them up with their own accounts on your PC. These guest accounts don't give them access to your files, email and so on.


Go to Settings, then User Accounts and select 'Add someone else to this PC' under 'Other users'. If the guest already has a Microsoft account, they can enter their email address or phone number to retrieve all the settings, bookmarks and apps that are stored in their account.

If your guest doesn't have a Microsoft account, or if they don't want the fuss of registering an account with Microsoft, click the small 'I don't have this person's sign-in information' link at the bottom of the screen requesting an email address. Then on the next screen,

click the tiny 'Add a user without a Microsoft account' link (see screenshot above right) at the bottom. You'll be asked to choose a username and password for the new account.

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Problems Solved

PROBLEM OF THE FORTNIGHT

Has 7-Zip installed malware on my PC?

I followed some online advice and installed 7-Zip (www.7-zip.org), because it's apparently one of the best programs for compressing files. I use it to reduce the size of the photo archives generated during my various birdwatching expeditions, and I have to say it all seems to work very well. However, soon after I installed it I noticed a new option on the right-click menu in Windows. Well, two new options - but only one concerns me. Right below the 7-Zip entry is one called 'CRC SHA'. If I click this a sub-menu opens with lots of cryptic entries, such as 'CRC-32' and 'SHA-1'. I have no idea what these options are or what this menu is for, or even if it relates to 7-Zip. Obviously, I daren't click any of them.

However, I think it appeared around the same time I installed 7-Zip, and it's directly beneath 7-Zip in the menu. Has 7-Zip installed malware on my PC? Or have I picked up an infection from somewhere else?

7-Zip has not installed malware on your PC and you have not picked up an infection from elsewhere. This submenu was added by 7-Zip, though that fact wasn't made clear – and nor was the purpose of the options it contains.

You can use this sub-menu to generate what's known as a 'cryptographic hash' code. If you then send this file to someone, they can do the same at the other end to check that it's your original file. If their hash code doesn't match yours, the file has somehow changed en route.

That might be of use to you if you share your photos but, in the context of software downloaded from the

internet, the real point of cryptographic hashes is to enable users to verify that they're downloading original code.

Let's say you download a program and notice that the developer has published an SHA1 hash code for it. Once the file has downloaded to your PC, you can right-click it, point to the CRC SHA menu added by 7-Zip and then choose SHA1. A box will open with a hash code. If this matches the one published by the developer, then you know the file is legitimate.

The other options in the CRC SHA menu are merely different types of hash function. If you come across a download with a CRC-64 or SHA-256 hash, you'd use the relevant option to check that the file is legitimate.

So, the CRC SHA sub-menu does no harm and you might find it useful. However, if you don't wish to use it, you can hide it. In 7-Zip open the Tools menu and choose Options. Now select the 7-Zip tab and clear the tick from the 'CRC SHA >' box. Click OK.

What's causing this startup message?


Every time I start my Windows 8.1 computer a message pops up saying "The Start menu was updated to the latest version", along with a list of things that are new. This pop-up has no claimed ownership, so I don't trust it – and there's only an OK button so I can't clear it. What does it mean, how might it have got there in the first place, and how can I now get rid of it?

A It means you might've installed something that's come with a potentially unwanted program (PUP). We've said before that PUP is something of a misnomer because virtually always such tools are actually unwanted, if not downright harmful.

In this case, because of the specific wording of the message you're seeing, we think you have Pokki. This isn't harmful but is very typical of a PUP, and we'd recommend removing it. Fortunately, it's pretty easy to do.

In Windows 8.1, press Windows key+X, select Control Panel, then click 'Uninstall a program', under Programs. You need to uninstall up to four items: Pokki, Pokki Download Helper, Host App Service and Start Menu. Depending on how you picked up this PUP, only one or two of these might be present. Click each entry to select it, then click Uninstall followed by Yes. Now restart your PC.

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How do I stop Gmail showing old photos?

We're in the middle of buying a flat and my wife urgently needed to send me a legal document to check. The scanned document's file was about 7MB but my work email blocks attachments over 5MB. So I had the bright idea of having her send it to my Gmail account, as I know this can handle larger files.

It worked, but the moment I opened her email at work I was embarrassed to see a bunch of old personal photos appearing down the right-hand side of the Gmail window under the heading 'Recent photos'. Neither of us uses Gmail very often and these photos aren't recent, but where did these photos come from and how do I stop Gmail displaying them?

We're assuming you don't often delete emails because Gmail has dredged up these photos from your old email exchanges with your wife. In an effort to be helpful, Gmail displays

thumbnails of the last few images sent to you by the current contact. In this case, the 'Recent photos' were quite simply the last images your wife sent to you via Gmail, which was some years ago by the sounds of it.

In fact, the entire right-hand column in Gmail is reserved for what Google calls the People widget. Other information can appear here, including Google+ details and summaries of recent emails. The People widget can't be modified, but it can be disabled. Click the cog icon at the top-right and choose Settings. Now select the General tab, scroll down to the People Widget section then select 'Hide the people widget'. After that, scroll down a bit


further and click Save Changes.

If you'd prefer to keep the People widget but just remove the offending photos, you'll need to delete the related emails (Gmail doesn't let you delete only attachments). A quick way to find the relevant emails is to click in the Gmail search bar, type from:yourwife@ heraddress.com has:attachment and press Enter. Tick the unwanted emails then click Delete.

Why won't my grandson's laptop work at home?

I upgraded my grandson's laptop to Windows 10, and it all went well. But when my grandson took his laptop home, it always failed to boot beyond the Windows Desktop. All it does is reboot, and display some message about a 'DPC watchdog violation'. When I bring the laptop back to my house, it boots fine. Any idea what could cause this strange behaviour?

Devices such as external hard drives and memory sticks If your upgraded Windows 10 laptop fails to boot, identify problem external devices and update their drivers

can cause this type of problem.

Use trial and error to find out which device is causing the problem. For example, it might be that the laptop works fine with your mouse, but crashes without it because its built-in touchpad's drivers are clashing with Windows 10.

With the offending device identified use your grandson's normal setup to launch Windows 10, then press Windows key+X and click Device Manager.

Right-click the problematic device, choose Properties followed by Driver and then click Update Driver (or Roll Back Driver if no new drivers exist).


Can I try Android on my PC?



You have often suggested trying operating systems in VirtualBox. Can I try Android this way? John Edmonds

Yes. Obviously you must first install VirtualBox, so download the latest version from www. virtualbox.org. For the Android operating system download the Android-x86 project from www.snipca.com/18336 just click the green Download button to download the ISO file.

To install Android you need to set up a new virtual computer and then 'mount' the downloaded ISO file. In VirtualBox, click New, type a name for your virtual Android computer, set Type to Other and Version to Other/Unknown, then click Next. Set the memory to at least 512MB (or more if your system can spare it) then click Next. Select the 'Create a virtual hard drive now' button then click Create.

The next few boxes that appear do have options you can change if you want, but if you're in a hurry, just click Next (twice) and then Create.

Now select the new virtual computer and click Start. In the virtual computer window, open the Device menu and point to 'CD/DVD Devices' followed by 'Choose

a virtual CD/DVD disc file' (see screenshot), then navigate to and select the ISO file downloaded earlier. Open the Machine menu, select Reset and your Android setup will begin. If you want to try it without a full install, just choose 'Live CD - Run Android x86 without installation'.

Why won't Android 6 Marshmallow connect to my PC?

My Nexus 5 has always worked perfectly when connected by USB to my Windows 7 PC, letting me drag and drop files. I found this function very useful, because it let me use my smartphone as a portable drive. However, having upgraded to Android 6 (Marshmallow), from Android 5, this function no longer works. When I connect my phone now, Windows Explorer still opens and knows that my Nexus 5 is connected, but when I click the Nexus 5 icon I can't see any files or folders. Do you know why this is?

Yes - Google has changed the way that the Nexus 5 responds when connected by cable to a PC. We're not entirely sure why it has done this, but it's probably for security reasons.

In order for your smartphone's file system (and therefore your files and folders) to be accessible on your computer, you must now give

permission via your phone. This will appear as a notification on the lock screen but, if you have a lot of notifications there, it'll be pushed to

the bottom of the list - and therefore won't be visible on screen. Alternatively, if your Nexus 5 displays its home screen when you connect, the notification is sent direct to the notifications panel, so you won't see it at all.

From your lock screen, tap the plus '+' symbol to see hidden notifications or, from the home screen, swipe down from the top-left. Next, tap 'USB for charging' followed by the 'Transfer files (MTP)' button. If you just want access to the photo folders, instead choose 'Transfer photos (PTP)' - because this makes it a bit easier to navigate.

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BBC iPlayer



Fix poor video quality, find the missing HD option and disable your VPN

Error message says you're outside the UK

If iPlayer tells you you're not in the UK when you are, check whether you've installed VPN software such as CyberGhost (www.cyberghostvpn.com – see screenshot below). Tools like these mask your computer's IP address to make it look like you're connecting from a different country. So, try disabling any VPN tool you have installed.

However, it could be that the router has picked up a non-UK IP address from your internet service provider (ISP): they sometimes do this when their UK-based IP address stocks are running low. Log into your router by typing your IP address (something like 192.168.0.1 or similar) into your web browser's address bar. Now look for options to release and renew the 'lease' on the IP address. If you can't find these, call your ISP and ask them to issue a UK-based IP address to your router. If all else fails, unplug your router for a while; or just wait a day, because many ISPs automatically expire and renew IP address leases every 24 hours.

Video stops playing or is poor quality

BBC iPlayer uses adaptive bit rates, which means it sends less data when your connection slows down. The intention is to keep the picture moving, by reducing quality. If it happens often, your

connection might not be fast enough to run iPlayer at the best quality. Click 'Watch in SD' to switch from high definition (HD) to standard definition (SD). Also, try to spot if there's a pattern when the quality drops. Perhaps Windows Update runs at the same time vou watch EastEnders every day? In Windows, click Start, type windows update then click Windows Update, followed by 'Change settings'. Open the dropdown menu and choose 'Check for updates but let me choose whether to download or install them' (see screenshot above). This isn't an option in Windows 10, but you can trick it to stop downloading updates. Click Start, Settings, 'Network & internet' then WiFi. Click 'Advanced settings' and switch on 'Metered connection'. Windows updates are important for the security of your PC, so this should be a temporary measure.

Downloads app goes blank

Using the iPlayer Downloads program in Windows 10? If you notice that the playback window goes blank when you exit full-screen mode, you're not alone – it's a bug that the BBC knows about. It doesn't have a fix yet, but ensure your graphics card drivers are up to date, and also clear the iPlayer Downloads cache: click Settings followed by 'Clear cache' in the Advanced section.

The HD option is missing

If you're certain that a show was broadcast in HD then you might just have to wait a while: live programmes can take some time to appear on iPlayer. Even then, standard definition versions are added first, followed by HD quality.

Can't download to smartphone or tablet

BBC iPlayer is like any other app: it has some minimum requirements. For Apple devices, this means a device running iOS 7 or later, so if you're using an older iPhone or iPad you might be out of luck. To check if your Apple gadget is upgradable, tap Settings followed by General and then Software Update. Android users have less to worry about here, as iPlayer will theoretically work with devices from Android 2.3 (Gingerbread) onwards. However, there are numerous Android devices that are simply incompatible with iPlayer – see the BBC's list at www. snipca.com/18500.

Strange voices talk over programmes

You've accidentally clicked the 'AD' rather than 'HD' playback button. AD stands for 'Audio Description', which is a great feature if you have impaired vision, but an annoyance otherwise. Not all programmes have it but where they do iPlayer positions the AD button right below the HD button. They look almost identical, so it's easy to click or tap the wrong one. To disable it, just click or tap the AD button or the 'Turn AD off' link (see screenshot below). If you're watching in full-screen mode, you'll need to exit that first – on a PC, just press Escape (Esc).

Error messages

suppose I should be pleased that error messages are getting friendlier. Sure, Windows 10's stability (or lack thereof) hasn't always filled me with confidence, but at least when things go pear-shaped it tells me something that sounds like it's been written by a human being.

'The server stumbled, page could not be loaded' is easier to take than 'Windows store error, exception xxxgetstuffed', even if it means you'll be jumping through hoops for the next two hours just to get a few updates to download. And while I'm not a big fan of 'We couldn't complete the updates. Undoing changes. Don't turn off your computer', at least it explains roughly what's gone wrong.

It hasn't always been thus. I've been using Windows since the dark days of Windows 3.1, where getting any work done involved some passing familiarity with the MS-DOS command line. Then you'd get beauties like an endless scroll of 'Not reading drive A. Abort, Retry, Fail?' or that most helpful of messages, 'General Failure'. When General Failure was in town you knew his comrades Major Fault and Captain Cock-Up could not be far behind, and on that count Microsoft never let you down. Basically, you were

stuffed. In those days, developers wrote error messages for other developers, and – with no Google to help – the odds against you decoding their technobabble were longer than the Great Wall of China.

Things hardly improved in the Windows 95/98 era, when I worked as a reviewer and had to make sense of pre-release software and hardware. It was rare that a week went by without the good old 'Blue screen of death' (BSOD) informing me ominously that 'A fatal exception has occurred'. If you were

really unlucky, your PC might reset itself and then go into a deadly spiral of further blue screens and resets. Otherwise, it might sit there, waiting gormlessly for you to turn it off and on again, when what you really wanted to do was turn it off permanently with a sledgehammer. I sometimes think Microsoft considered this a Windows feature. The way error messages came and went without any good

reason would leave the user in a nearconstant state of suspense.

If you didn't get the good old BSOD, then you might get equally impenetrable messages informing you that you were the victim of one of a bewildering range of Windows Protection errors, or that (a personal favourite) 'The action could not be completed. The action could not be completed'. Clearly Microsoft thinks saying it twice makes an unknown error less annoying.

Meanwhile, nothing quite brightens up your day more than waiting hours for a program to install only to be told 'Unable to start the program. One of the installed components may be missing'. I respond by hissing, "Some of *your* installed components may go missing, you little [expletive deleted]".

So why do the new error messages still drive me up the wall? Because some of them are as much use as an inflatable dartboard. It's all very well for Office to inform me, 'Something went wrong. Sorry, we ran into a problem', but it doesn't actually tell me anything about the problem, what caused it or what I need to do to fix it. Ditto the nowlegendary 'Something happened. Something happened'.

Most of all though, these new error messages remind me of the kind of cheerful, agreeable but utterly useless nonsense you get when you phone the water company to find out why there's nothing coming out of your tap. When an update won't install I don't want a cute quip or some vague reassuring message. No, I want to feel that this is a known problem that's being fixed. And I certainly *don't* want to have to type the error code into Google. In fact, there's only one thing I really, really want: how about software that, you know, just works?
