How to Make Your Own Liquid Laundry Soap

<u>Dr. Bronner's Pure Castile Soap</u> claims 18 cleaning uses in one bottle. One of those is laundry soap. Want to know how to make your own using only a cup of Dr. Bronner's per 64 loads? Check it out:

This laundry soap doesn't create suds, but it doesn't need to in order to get your laundry clean.

What You Need

- 1 cup Dr. Bronner's pure castile liquid soap
- 1 cup baking soda





- 2 cups water
- 1/3 cup salt

Instructions

Warm the water and mix with salt and baking soda until dissolved. Pour into a one-gallon container. Add the Dr. Bronner's and fill the remainder of the gallon jar with water. Use 1/4 cup of laundry soap per load.

This makes a full gallon of laundry soap, which will last 64 loads.






Also, Dr. Bronner's instructions say that you can use 1/3 cup of soap and 1/2 cup of vinegar...does that mean we can put more soap than is called for?




